



Double Tree. In terms of food there is much to pick from in walking distance from the Hotel.




Yet we know it is not about Omaha or any other city we find ourselves in. It is about God and God's mission and call to the Community Churches to meet in Annual Conference.

President's Message Rev. Dr. Bruce N. Merton

January is named after Janus, a Roman god, who had two faces. He could look back at the past and forward to the future.

At the beginning of 2014 we are a little like Janus. We look at the past reflectively, longingly, and, maybe, ruefully. We look to the future expectantly, hopefully, anxiously, and, maybe, fearfully.

At the fulcrum of past and future is the present. And what we do with the opportunity of the present largely determines for our lives the effects of the past and our effectiveness in the future.

The scripture urges "redeem your time wisely."

How do we do that?

It all begins by using the fulcrum of the present to renew our primary allegiance to the God, who through Christ, says, "Behold, I make all things new."

Time is a gift from God. You and I have done nothing to deserve it. We can do nothing to earn it. It cannot be purchased.

We cannot stop time, slow time or turn it off.

We cannot bring time back. Once it is gone, it is gone.

It's A New Year

It's 2014. Happy new year!

A bit of history: a century ago the year 1914 began with European imperial powers ruling over most of the world. Steam engines and (literal) horse power got us from one place to another. In the US most immigration was from Europe. In the US and Europe there was a great deal of faith in "progress," variously defined. Nearly everyone expected that peace would continue to be the rule among what were then called the "civilized nations." Almost nobody foresaw the beginning of World War I later in 1914. The few who ventured to predict the future were marginal figures in a literary genre not yet called science fiction. In the Christian church it was assumed that outside missionaries would always persist in their task of bringing the gospel to indigenous populations worldwide, from a majority base in northern hemisphere nations.

A century has taught us that change is the only constant. What "is" is constantly being challenged by all kinds of alternate futures. We in the church have been slow to learn that lesson. In the early 1900's many theologians (who of all people should have known better) bought into the theory that progress marked by peace was inevitable. They were to be disappointed by a century of conflict. In the 1920's, many Christians in the US thought prosperity was a constant, only to be surprised by the Great Depression. In the 1960's US suburban churches built huge Sunday

School wings onto their church buildings on the basis of baby boom population trends – and then somebody went and invented the Pill. Nobody expected that southern hemisphere nations would ever think about sending missionaries to the northern hemisphere, but that too is happening.

With that century's worth of experience, trying to look into the church's future is a venture attempted only by fools. But as one who would be a fool for Christ's sake, I'll give it a try. If humans are living on this planet then, there are several marks we can expect of vital local churches in the year 2114.

Diversity will rule. Within the same vital Christian congregation, there will be a variety of first languages, a variety of ethnic backgrounds, and a variety of life experiences and expectations. Governmental regulations to slow down or stop population movement have never been successful, and that fact won't change. If the local church you belong to is ministering in 2114, it's certain that many of the people in the congregation won't look like you.

Ministries will change. In one US East Coast urban neighborhood, single family townhouses were built in the 1890's for upper middle class families. By the 1950's these buildings became apartments, largely for low income folk. In the 1980's the neighborhood was "gentrified" and the buildings became single family homes

RED LETTER REVOLUTION: What If Jesus Really Meant What He Said?;


Shane Claiborne//Tony Campolo, Thomas Nelson, 2012, 260 pages, \$22.99

I was given a red letter edition of the Bible on the day that I was baptized. Everything attributed to what Jesus said was printed in red. Shane Claiborne and Tony Campolo consider themselves to be Evangelical Christians but they are very different from many others who claim to be Evangelical Christians these days. The difference is that they take very seriously what Jesus said and believe that he meant what he said. Their interpretation of Jesus' teaching reveals Jesus as the champion of the poor, the despised, and the outcast. They insist that an obedient commitment to the teachings of Jesus puts genuine Christians on the front lines in the battle against poverty, injustice, racism, and economic oppression which change the world for the better.

The authors call themselves "Red Letter Christians" in order to avoid the widespread image that the word evangelical portrays someone who is anti-gay, anti-feminist, antienvironmentalist. pro-war. procapital punishment, and conservative Republican. Instead they believe that we are called into an intentional community which is committed to peace and a simple lifestyle that puts into practice the teaching of Jesus about how we live.

Claiborne quotes Kierkegaard who said, "The Bible is very easy to understand. But we Christians... pretend to be unable to understand it because we know very well that the minute we understand, we are obliged to act accordingly." We need to be more concerned about living every day

as Jesus meant us to live by loving our neighbor, praying for enemies and gracefully following Jesus who "shows us what God is like with skin on--in a way we can see, touch, and feel." (pp. 6-7)



Throughout this book Claiborne and Campolo propose an authentic Christianity that looks more like Jesus. They declare the good news that "Jesus has survived the embarrassing things that we Christians have done in his name, as found in the dark side of the history of fundamentalism, the messiness of the religious Right, and even more recently, in folks who burn the Koran and hold signs that say 'God Hates Fags." The good news is that Jesus had a lot to say about economics, violence, war and peace. "He wasn't just talking about what happens after we die. He was talking about how we live right now. He was talking about widows and orphans, laborers and wages," and the things that concern ordinary people every day. (p. 14)

They devote whole chapters to things like the Family, On Being Pro-life, Homosexuality, Immigration, Empire, Politics, etc.

I particularly liked Tony Campolo's remark about John 3:16: "We should know that in the original language of the Bible, the word for world is cosmos, which means literally everything that is ...God's salvation is not just for individuals. His salvation is for everything in this world...God loves chickens; he loves the trees, he loves the mountains. He loves everything he has made and says 'It is good"... This world that God loves will not be destroyed! Instead, it will be renewed." (p. 255) But in order for that to happen Christians must "live simply so others may simply live!!" (p. 20)

again. Lately some have been changed back into apartments and the average income in the area has been decreasing. Neighborhood churches that could not adjust to the changes went out of business. The pace of change is increasing, and the pace of change in ministries will have to keep up.

Technology will make demands and present opportunities. Can you imagine having a conversation about the church with a 1914 church member? How would you explain internet Bible studies, television evangelists, DVD's in Sunday School classes, Youtube videos of local church worship services, and so many other innovations? If the changes of the last century seem amazing, "you ain't seen nothin' yet!"

Some things won't change. Joy, peace and hope will be shared by vital congregations then as now. Relationships will be built. Spiritual and physical needs will still be met by dedicated Christians. And one other thing: there will still be a need to proclaim and to exemplify the unity of Christ's church. In its sixtythree years of ministry, the ICCC has had more than one structure and more than one name. We have always said that the structure is subordinate to the mission. Given the pace of change the Council won't look as it does now and may not even carry the same name (Inter-galactic Council ?!?) But the vision of Christ's people drawn into the unity of God's love will remain, and still inspire discipleship in one Spirit.

One more constant: you and I are called to build the future even as we move into it. The quest for Christian unity in peace and justice is a holy one. I pray that you will join with me as we advance that quest by deed as well as by word in 2014 and beyond.
