Executive Director's Message

Can We All Just Get Along?

“There is neither Greek nor Jew, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male or female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus” Galatians 3:28

On March 3, 1991, Rodney King, an African American resident of Los Angeles, was violently arrested by Los Angeles police. A bystander videotaped the event, and the incident raised a public outcry among those who believed it was a racially motivated attack. The acquittal in a state court of the four police officers, charged with using excessive force, provided the spark that led to the 1992 Los Angeles riots/rebellion. Rodney King made a public plea appealing for calm during the riots saying - “People, I just want to say, you know, can we all just get along? Can we get along? Can we stop making it horrible for the older people and the kids?... It’s just not right. It’s not right. It’s not, it’s not going to change anything. We’ll, we’ll get our justice....”

The racial tension and divide that faced our nation in 1992 is alive and well today, and it was the same environment when ICCC was organized in 1950. ICCC was organized in 1950 with the merger of the predominantly African-American body called the Biennial Council of the People’s

Church of Christ and Community Centers, and the primarily European-American body called the National Council of Community Churches. Leaders of both organizations saw that neither denomination nor race should separate the people of God. Following their shared vision, the leaders of both organizations worked for the reconciliation and the healing of divisions in the church of Jesus Christ and American society.

The vision that led to the creation of ICCC was a bold and profound statement at its time when racial segregation and division prevailed in much of American church life and society. For such a time as this in the year 2018 when our nation continues to experience major racial and other social divisions, the role of the ICCC’s voice in the public arena for human

reconciliation, justice, dignity, and healing is ever more needed today!

As members of ICCC, God has called us to work for racial and social unity and harmony, affirming unity amid God’s beautiful diverse creation. We need to lift God’s Good News that every person, regardless of race, gender, nationality, immigration status, sexuality is a child of God, and each person should be respected with dignity and compassion. Let us continue to stand up in and with our communities to build God’s beloved community.

BOOK REVIEWS

JUST MERCY: A Story of Justice and Redemption

by Bryan Stevenson **** 1/2 stars.

Byron Stevenson's memoir, *Just Mercy*, reveals a fascinating truth: "My years of struggling against inequality, abusive power, poverty, oppression, and injustice had finally revealed something to me about myself. Being close to suffering, death, executions, and cruel punishments didn't just illuminate the brokenness of others; in a moment of anguish and heartbreak, it also exposed my own brokenness. You can't effectively fight abusive power, poverty, inequality, illness, oppression, or injustice and not be broken by it" (p. 288).



Just Mercy contributes to the body of literature on mass incarceration such as Michelle Alexander's *The New Jim Crow* or Ruth Wilson Gilmore's *Golden Gulag*, or John Grisham's *An Innocent Man*. *Just Mercy* explores the origins of mass incarceration and offers an intriguing understanding about how people are intertwined in the system of change and status quo.

As a valuable educational tool for young adults and clergy, *Just Mercy* has a study guide that help readers understand fully its 16 chapters. *Just Mercy* is an excellent resource for anyone's library for understanding the criminal justice system and

understanding redemption. Here's a couple of discussion questions and activities from Chapter 1, Mockingbird Players and Chapter 15, Broken.

Stevenson's narrative reveals our brokenness as we pursue mercy and justice in an unjust and cruel criminal justice system. At every turn in this pursuit, Stevenson reveals the contradictions and paradoxes of our times. Stevenson tells us he is from a ... poor, rural, racially segregated settlement on the eastern shore of the Delmarva Peninsula, in Delaware, where the racial history of this country casts a long shadow... unapologetically Southern (p.14).

Stevenson's family history in faith guided him to studying philosophy at Eastern University, a Christian university, near Philadelphia Pennsylvania. After graduation, he realized the practical limits of his philosophy degree, but he also realized it was excellent preparation for a successful tour at Harvard Law School and the Kennedy School of Government, where he earned his law and public policy degrees.

While completing his law degree, the curiosity of his grandfather's murder started to take shape when an internship led to his employment at the Southern Prisoners Defense Committee (now the Southern Center for Human Rights). From these experiences, and an unsuccessful start of a legal clinic, Stevenson founded the Equal Justice Initiative (EJI), a private, nonprofit organization that challenges poverty and racial injustice, advocates for equal treatment in the criminal justice system, and creates hope for marginalized communities. *Just Mercy* records his transformation.

Stevenson's life purpose emerges with the case of Walter McMillian. McMillian was convicted by the partiality of life and not the facts of a courtroom. Stevenson discovers why McMillian was wrongfully convicted and works for McMillian being released after 6 years on death row.

Chapter 1, Mockingbird Players.

Discussion Question:

What famous novel was written in Monroe County, Al, and how is it relevant to *Just Mercy*? (Hint: Actor Gregory Peck was the Academy Award for Best Actor for his role as Atticus Finch in this 1962 film adapted from the novel).

Chapter 15, Broken.

Discussion Question

Discuss the ways in which the system failed Jimmy Dill. Discuss the ways the system is failing in your community.

Activity

In this chapter, Stevenson feels overwhelmed and is ready to quit. Write him a letter outlining all the reasons you would encourage him to continue on at the EJI.

OR

You have a friend who is overwhelmed with ministry and is ready to quit. Write them a letter outlining all the reasons you would encourage them to continue.

Great!

For next month, if you are willing to share your answers, we will post them and in the next installment of *Attend to Reading*. We will look at other discussion questions and activities from key chapters in *Just Mercy*.

ICCC: A Higher Purpose

I believe it was 2007 when I bought my first hybrid vehicle. I must admit ... I was a little hesitant at first. You hear the stories of problems – the big expensive batteries wearing out, not enough power for the vehicle to climb hills, limited range of travel, and on and on but I forged ahead and bought the dealer demo model of a Toyota Highlander Hybrid. I am on the road a lot for work as well as personal stuff so I LIVE IN my car. As I began to drive the vehicle – live with the vehicle – I become familiar with all its systems, I found that the “stories” were not true. The car had GREAT power, a 10-year maintenance free battery, great gas mileage, no limits on range (didn’t need to be recharged like an electric car) and, most importantly – IT MADE SO MUCH SENSE. A hybrid vehicle: a car powered by an engine that can produce all the power of an internal combustion engine but can automatically switch over to an electric motor while idling at a traffic signal or in heavy traffic when less power is needed – thereby reducing emissions and saving fuel. Since then I have always owned a hybrid vehicle. And I often say, “**Why aren’t ALL CARS made this way?**” Now stick with me while I bring this home

I was raised in rural Virginia. As a child, I (probably like you) was “taken” to church. My mother was our family’s primary church-goer. She went to the church to which she had always gone - the Mallow Presbyterian Church – right in her little community of Mallow – the church to which her father went. I wasn’t asked for input on this decision. I was a young child and not in the position to say, “I have read the writings of John Calvin, Martin Luther and John Wesley and I have decided I would like to affiliate with the Presbyterian Church.” No I went to the church my family went to, where we mingled with other people of the community of Mallow who we had known for years, where we played softball, had church suppers, made macaroni crafts in Bible School, prayed for each other, sent cards to the sick



... a church that was a faith community within the community. Did it really matter that the sign said “Presbyterian?” Could the sign have said “Methodist,” or “Baptist,” or “Church of Christ” or “COMMUNITY” Church? **Why aren’t ALL churches made this way?**

So, after spending much of my religious life calling myself a “Presbyterian” – after being organist for churches of different denominations

– after being re-baptized by immersion in a Southern Baptist church in Richmond, VA (something that was personally meaningful to me) – I now proudly say I am a member of Wilson Memorial Union Church, a congregation of the International Council of Community Churches. We are the sole Protestant church in our community – we seek to welcome all who wish to follow Christ – we also collaborate with the Catholic Church in our area. Instead of being out here

alone in the world **we like to be represented by a central office** that seeks to represent all like-minded churches who work under the banner of COMMUNITY CHURCH – creating community wherever



they may happen to be. **We speak out** to remind our nation and the world that the reason for which we were created is still relevant today – whether black or white – we are ONE in Christ. **We seek to draw the circle wider** – to other races, other cultures, people in other circumstances - and draw in others **under the umbrella of COMMUNITY**. In fact, through our Ecumenical Committee, **we collaborate** with our Presbyterian, Methodist, Lutheran, Baptist, Episcopal, United Church of Christ, et al fellow Christians ... to continue to work for that higher purpose ... WE ARE ONE IN JESUS CHRIST.

The men and women I have met at Annual Conference over the last 15 years representing ICCC churches from all over the country have become my brothers and sisters. I love them. There is no substitute for standing shoulder to shoulder with folks - worshipping, praying, singing, having Bible study, sharing a meal. TOGETHERNESS and RESPECT - makes for community.
