President's Message ——

On a recent visit to an ICCC meeting long before the government and the digital age heightened our use of acronyms, they were part of Christianity's development. Continuing into the present, we have made use of the "fish" as a symbol of the Christian faith. Behind the symbol is the Greek word "icthus." The Greek letters that spell fish formed the acronym "Jesus Christ, God's Son, Savior." Simply writing the word "fish" in Greek provided an early, veiled confessional statement. Today we find the word and/or the symbol on everything from bumper stickers to the stained glass windows of churches.

Acronyms, words formed by the initial letters of a name or by combining parts of a series of words, are a way of life! They are so much a part of our lexicon that we now use acronyms without even thinking of the names or phrases behind them. Think "radar" for "<u>ra</u>dio <u>d</u>etecting <u>and ranging</u>. Or "scuba" for "<u>self contained underwater</u> <u>b</u>reathing <u>apparatus</u>.

Those who use electronic messaging can rarely write a full message without using acronyms: LOL (laugh out loud), BFF (best friends forever). We hardly ever talk using the full name of our organization: The International Council of Community Churches. We know it and speak it as the I.C.C.C.

As we begin, with God in Christ, to "live, move and have our being" in a new year, I have been thinking about the possibilities that exist for the I.C.C.C. in terms of two different acronyms.

One, S.S.D.D. (**s**ame **s**tuff **d**ifferent **d**ay), I have been familiar with for a long time. It implies hum-drum existence, life in a rut, and the continuation, ad nauseum, of nagging issues and problems. The second, N.Y.N.D., was new to me. I first saw it on the front of a tee shirt worn by a 'twenty-something' in our local mall. The green shirt with the large orange letters had a question mark under the acronym. This was an acronym I did not know. My curiosity was piqued with respect to the acronym and its punctuation.



the lifestyle of Jesus, the Christ, in the world around us.

Catching up to the young man wearing the shirt, I tapped him on the shoulder. He stopped, turned, looked at me with a "deer in the headlights" look. I quickly said, "I get the back of the shirt. What does "N.Y.N.D." mean?"

He replied, "Oh, man! It means "New Year, New Day" and the question mark invites you to ask if it can be that for you. Since you get the back of the shirt, you know the answer."

Yes, I know the answer. The question for me and for others who "know" the answer is this: Do we live the answer? Do I and we, as the I.C.C.C., really immerse ourselves in Christ and stand amazed at the incredible God revealed by him? Do I and we, as I.C.C.C., really immerse ourselves 'in Christ' by living his lifestyle in the world around us?

I do not recall any portion of the gospel record that finds Jesus asking "What's in it for me?" as he contemplates meeting human need or building up the lives of those who will form the early church.


I cannot think of a time when Jesus

As I turned to go back and satisfy my curiosity by questioning the t-shirt's wearer, I noticed the back of the shirt. It read, in large orange letters, "YES!" and beneath it, in smaller letters, "I Cor. 5:17."

I knew I Corinthians 5:17. It reminds us that if we are in Christ, we are new creations. The old passes away and all things become new. It is a powerful affirmation of what happens to lives that are immersed in Christ. Immersed in the reality of what God has done for us in Jesus, the Christ; immersed in living withheld his support, care, compassion or grace because he did not receive a sufficient amount of benefits in exchange.

You and I would not, could not, be in Christ as new creations if Jesus had thought about the 'investment' in terms of getting a 'guaranteed return' or 'certain benefits'.



It is a sharing that we, as new creations in Christ, relish and celebrate as the very source of our salvation. How Will Our Churches Grow in 2013?

How do Christian congregations grow, both internally – in spirit, – and externally – in numbers? This is a question that has absorbed greater minds than mine for a very long time. But many of the proposed answers amount to repetitious slogans that sound impressive but produce no results.



First let's get past the obvious. It's easy to pontificate about church growth from a location that is economically healthy and increasing in general population. To attain numerical growth in such locations requires a consistent effort at marketing and sales to get people in the door, and a reasonably good product to keep them connected: non-boring worship; attractive programming for children and youth; opportunities for adults to develop friendships; and decent cooking at church suppers.

Likewise it's easy to protest from areas that are shrinking in population and not doing well economically that spiritual quality trumps numerical quantity, and that there is close fellowship found in congregations that admittedly most members joined before color televisions were introduced. For those who attend, the Bible studies and adult Sunday school classes in such churches are experienced as times when spiritual insights are deepened and fervent prayer is shared.

Can a congregation find both growth in spirit and growth in numbers in 2013? I believe the answer is "yes we can."

The "yes" is multi-part beginning with the Pastor. "Where there is no vision, the people perish," but vision does not begin as a group exercise. Vision begins with one individual who is called not only to see visions and dream dreams, but to communicate them to others. In a local congregation, that's the Pastor. Often, a new vision springs forth as the Pastor asks some questions of self and others. "What would this congregation and our ministry look like if we weren't limited by our present numbers, budget, building size and all the rest?" Or, "If we were starting this church as a brand new ministry in this community, what would we want it to look like; what would we want to do first?" Or, if we just dropped all that we're doing now as a congregation, and we had to choose just one "thing" – one emphasis or one program or one central theme – what would it be?" Or, "What is the one crying need in our community – the foremost issue or crisis or chronic challenge – that desperately needs our attention and care?" Most important: "What do we believe God would have us do in this place and in this time?"

Part two begins with those involved in the church's organization. As the Pastor communicates a new vision for the church, the boards, committees, council, etc. need to respond. This is difficult. Agendas are not designed to encourage thinking about purpose. It's easy for discussion about minor details to fill so many hours that there's no time to delve into matters new and sometimes frightening. By its focus a vision includes some things and excludes others; confronting difficult choices can be a wrenching experience for a church board. And then there's the matter of follow-up. No matter how exciting the vision may be, if nobody does anything about it, it will die. A determined board that keeps asking at every meeting: "how are we doing in moving toward the vision," and that will not accept "not much" as an answer can help transform a congregation.

The congregation is the final part of the formula. The core members who worship, volunteer and serve faithfully; and the "regulars" who aren't quite as involved but still are mostly present: these are the people whose response will finally cause the vision to bear fruit. It is with these much more than with the "occasionals" and the "C&E's" that both Pastor and boards will need to communicate, sharing the vision and making it clear and compelling. Pastor and boards working in partner-

THESE FEW ALSO PAID A PRICE: Southern Whites who fought for Civil Rights; G. Mcleod Bryan, Mercer University Press, 2001, Hardback, 148 Pages.

G, Mcleod Bryan died at age 90 in 2010. He was professor emeritus of Wake Forest University where he taught Religion, Philosophy, and Christian Ethics. He also taught at Mercer University, Washington University, and Trinity Seminary in Nigeria during his long and distinguished career. He was one of my most inspiring professors who profoundly shaped my understanding of Social Ethics when I was a student at Mercer University. He taught not only in the classroom but also by example by his personal involvement in the Civil Rights movement.

Most white southerners strongly resisted the expansion of democracy (many violently). Bryan's THESE FEW ALSO PAID A PRICE "vividly recounts that there were white persons who, despite of their relative privilige and prosperity, were ready 'to do justice and love mercy." (P. 9) This book records brief testimonies of thirty white Southerners who stood up against America's intense hatred of justice for black people.

"Surely none of these whites regret the choice they made, nor would they likely refuse to repeat their stand if they had their lives to live over. Sure, it was tough, it was scary, it was dangerous, and life-threatening. On the other hand, it brought them a reward that money cannot buy. It brought them a new experience , a spiritual renewal from walking alongside a people being led by God from the wilderness of oppression into a land of freedom." (P.11) They stood up for American democracy and to declare their faith in a God of universal love for all.

The price they paid often involved bullets, beatings, bombings, and burnings. Yet the suffering they endured was far less than that blacks endured in slavery and Jim Crowism.

Many of the people listed here were personal acquaintances who became heroes and saints who encouraged my own involvement in Civil Rights, although my involvement was far less than any of them. They include Clarence Jordan, Conrad Browne, Myles Horton, Will Campbell and Tom Holmes. Many of the rest included in the list were indirectly influential in my life as well.

Clarence Jordan was founder of Koinonia Farm in Americus Georgia which was his dream of a Beloved Community. It was established in 1942 as an integrated community in the deep South, which practiced total pacifism as an answer to humanity's warring madness. The community re-enacted a "community of goods" advocated in the book of Acts. And it inspired the development of Habitat for Humanity. Jane and I once visited Clarence and counted 32 bullet holes in his living room wall as the result of opposition by white supremacists.

Conrad Browne left Koinonia Farm to become assistant director of Highlander Folk School. Myles Horton was one of the most gentle, peaceful men I have ever known' He established the Highlander Folk School in Monteagle, Tennessee which was instrumental in training many people involved in the Civil Rights Movement, including Martin Luther King and Rosa Parks, in the principles of non-violence. Myles had been a student of Reinhold Niebuhr at Union Theological Seminary. I got to know Myles when he was forced to move his school from Monteagle to Knoxville.

Tom Holmes was pastor of Tatnal Square Baptist Church located on the campus of Mercer University when Sam Oni, a Nigerian student who was the first Black to be admitted to the University, was denied entrance to the church for Sunday worship. Sam was a Christian convert won to Christ by Baptist missionaries who had graduated from Mercer. Tom's support of Oni brought about his ouster as pastor of the church and the congregation finally moved to a new location. That was the church in which I was baptized when I was 14 years old.

These testimonies are important to prevent us from forgetting the tremendous price blacks and whites paid for the expansion of American Democracy.

ship will need to recruit, enlist and inspire specific members of the congregation into particular actions that will further the vision.

The end result is growth. Sometimes the growth is all internal and spiritual. Sometimes it's all numerical. The best vision is one that produces both kinds of growth. So what's your vision? What vision is your church confronting, struggling with and following? Be sure to share with the rest of the community church movement how your vision is growing and bearing fruit!
