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#### INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF COMMUNITY CHURCHES NAMES NEW EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Press Release: March 12, 2018

The International Council of Community Churches, the nation's ground-breaking inter-racial fellowship of community-based churches and ministry centers, has called Rev. Phil Tom as its next Executive Director.

The International Council of Community Churches (ICCC) was formed in 1950. The Biennial Council of the Peoples Church of Christ and Community Centers led by Dr. Joseph M Evans (until then all African-American) and the National Council of Community Churches led by the Rev. Roy A Burkhardt (until then all Caucasian) merged to form the largest inter-racial church communion. Member churches are a fellowship of ecumenically-minded, freedom-loving congregations cooperating to work for Christian unity, justice and reconciliation. The Executive Director leads these efforts through the national office.

A native New Yorker, Rev Tom received his Bachelor's degree in Economics from Coe College but gradually became more and more interested in ministry. He received his M.A. in Community Development from the University of Chicago School of Social Service Administration and his Master of Divinity from McCormick Theological Seminary. Throughout his ministry and working life he has sought partnerships between churches, government and social organizations to develop communities and address such issues as affordable housing, job training, after-school programs for youth, worker justice and community organizing for a cause.

In addition to successfully pastoring churches, Rev Tom worked for the Indianapolis Neighborhood Housing Partnership. Through his office he worked with faithbased and neighborhood organizations, the City of Indianapolis, lenders, funders, and United Way to successfully create and implement a city-wide affordable housing development strategy. Dear ICCC Family,

I am honored and humbled to serve as your new Executive Director. I want to thank Rev. William Samuels and ICCC's Board for their vote of confidence in electing me to this position.

#### In the midst of Black History Month, I had a chance to sit down for coffee with Dr. Martin Marty. Now a sit down with Mr. Marty, renowned historian, is a special treat for me. Earlier in the month, the University of Chicago invited me to a celebration honoring his 90th birthday we were all asked to put on a bow tie for the **occasion** along with other festive attire-- but a big snow storm didn't allow me to attend. After an apology from me for missing the event, Mr. Marty thought we should still have a "sit down" discussion so that I could "catch him up" with my interpretation of the news of the world.

What a challenge! How do you begin to relay the issues and the world condition to a "contextual" historian amidst problems of "alternative truth" and slanted political news in the 21th century? When the ABC, NBC, and ABC networks asked Mr. Marty to comment on the 911 tragedy some years ago, the historian simply quoted from Psalm 46. "God is our refuge and our strength, a very present help in the time of trouble." Such was the bold Christianbased answer to an increasingly skeptical world.

I had a similar meal with Mr. Erik Erikson one afternoon at the Quadrangle—a spot chosen by author Don Browning (a religion and psychology scholar) who, along with my support as a student of psycho-history, invited the famed psychoanalytic author to our University.

Mr. Erikson, at the time, was interested in the concept of truth. After exploring the problem of identity from a psychoanalytic point of view in **Young Man Luther**, he was now turning his attention to **satayagraha** (truth force) in **Gandhi's** 

## President's Message Choosing Barabbas–An Easter Story Emerges After a Good Meal

**Truth**. What is to follow is a written record of what it means to dialogue with these two giants of history and psychoanalysis and how truth and historical context have become problems in modern discourse.

#### Pilate asked, "What is Truth"? John 18: 38

Now Jesus was brought to several trials beginning late Thursday night after the Passover meal with his disciples. Depending upon which evangelist you choose as witness for the story, early Friday morning: the chief priests (Caiaphas, Annas), the local government (Herod), as well as Roman government itself (Pilate), all had a chance to interrogate Jesus. After the arrest in the Garden of Gethsemane, Judas Iscariot, completed his end of the conspiracy bargain by grabbing hold of Jesus signifying; here he is—right here.


The chief priests, because they were part of the religious hierarchy of Jerusalem, had the first chance to inquire of his authority base. The questions followed the line of: "Who are you?" How do you spend your time? What is the nature of your power base? Are you a king? Let us see some of that magic you are known for.

Now the case against Jesus was "shaky." As Jesus reminded them, I have been in the open this week, and, for that matter throughout my ministry. The people should be able to report my activity which includes teaching, healing, encouraging, comforting and bringing people back to life. That's pretty much what I do. The angry witnesses began to shout "fake news." They needed lies, accusations and mis-direction to argue their case. After bouncing back and forth from interrogations and insults, Jesus was finally brought to Pilate. He, like Gandhi, had a desire to understand truth--whether there was really such a thing or merely a fantasy pushed by a naïve reading of the psalms. Gandhi's conclusion was that truth was indeed a force—a power that when acted upon could bring about nonviolent change in a world full of deception (satayagraha).

Pilate, apparently the voice of reason and reconciliation this wicked morning, offered one more attempt at a punitive action which would satisfy the hometown crowd. "You know," he said, "during this holiday it is customary to release one prisoner. Here is a man named 'son of the father' (Barabbas). He is a liar, fornicator, bully, thief, murderer and troublemaker under the cover of being for the people. Whom shall I set free into your streets amongst your women, children, lame and downtrodden? Shall it be Truth (Jesus) or Barabbas?"

And the people cried out: *Give Us Barabbas!!!* Now, how shall we go forward?





When I was privileged to serve Bridgeport Community Church, Michigan as pastor, we customarily ended each worship service by singing

Go in peace, and the peace of God be with you this day.

Go in peace and the peace of God be with you always.

Celebrate and share the joy! Celebrate new life!

Go in peace, and the peace of God be with you always.

Many then and now would tell us that's a strange thing to sing. After all, we live in a world of trouble and challenge. If we listen to the pundits, they will tell us that our future looks threatened, or threatening, or maybe both. Peace as the absence of conflict has been an elusive goal throughout human history.

And yet we sang peace. And we still sing peace. In our singing we aren't commenting on today's news reports. Rather, we are being prophetic and welcoming. God's peace is real, and like the Kingdom it is among us and still approaching, present and yet to come. Peace is unity deep enough not to need uniformity. Peace is diversity celebrated so widely that it overcomes division. Peace is good news that is as broad as the love of God. Peace is justice, rolling down like mighty waters. Peace is reconciliation, growing up out of the tiniest seeds of faith to become a mighty forest. Peace is unity, made possible in the Christ whose people we are and whose ministry is our gift. In short, peace is shalom: wholeness found in the grace of God's Holy Spirit.

Each year the Council recognizes two laypeople for service to the Council and to their local congregations. The Laywoman and Layman awards are designed to express our appreciation to individuals who:


- 1. Shared the open, welcoming, joyful spirit of the Council as well as items of Council news with their local congregations;

# Nomination Recommendations are Needed

Under the ICCC Bylaws, the Board of Directors act as the Nominating Committee for the Council. Terms of office begin at the close of Annual Conference. If you have suggestions for nominees or if you wish to be considered as a nominee for an office, please respond no later than MAY 30, 2018. Some offices are occupied by incumbents who are eligible for re-election. Nominations will be presented to the Annual Conference business sessions, at which additional nominations from the floor are in order. Available positions are as follows:

#### Officers

\$1000

President: The President serves for a term of one year, and may serve two consecutive terms (two years). Incumbent President the Rev. Dr. William Samuels is 'termed out" as of the 2018 Annual Conference.

Secretary: two year term, with a maximum of three consecutive terms.

*Treasurer:* two year term, with a maximum of three consecutive terms.

#### **Board of Directors**

All Vice Presidents are members of the Board of Directors. Each serves for a term of two years, with a maximum of three consecutive terms.

Vice President for Ecumenical and Interfaith Relationships. Vice President for Financial Development. Vice President for Informational Services and Outreach. Vice President for Membership Enlistment. Vice President for Planning. Vice President for Membership Services. Vice President for Regional Relationships – this position is currently vacant

#### **Board of Trustees**

Trustees serve a single five year term. No Trustee positions are up for election this year.

#### **Endowment Fund Trustees**

Endowment Fund Trustees serve for a term of three years, with a maximum of two terms.

<u>Two</u> Endowment Fund Trustee positions are up for election for the class maturing in 2021

The ICCC Endowment Fund was established by a resolution at the 2000 Annual Conference. The first gifts were received in 2001. Since that time, the Fund has grown to just in excess of \$330,000. There are examples of similar organizations, one with an Endowment Fund, and one without, in the same community, where the presence of a Fund helped one organization survive, while the other one, without the Fund, did not.

From 1993 – 1996 and 2000 - 2010, Rev Tom worked with the Presbyterian Church USA and helped to equip church congregations of diverse locations (rural to urban) to strengthen their congregational life and community outreach. In 2010, during the Obama Administration, Phil became Director of the US Department of Labor's Center for Faith-Based and Neighborhood Partnerships. He worked over the next five years with Secretaries of Labor Hilda Solis – then Thomas Perez – to build partnership with faith-based and community-based organizations related to worker justice and workforce development issues and programs.

More recently, Rev. Tom served as Interim Pastor of the Eastchester Presbyterian Church in Bronx, NY, completing that assignment in January 2018. Rev. Tom has several publications to his credit including Handbook for Urban Church Ministries And All Who Reach Out With Their Neighbors, co-edited with Sally Johnson , and Congregational-Based Community Organizing: Building Vital Congregations, Building Just Communities, Presbyterian Church (USA), 2009

Rev Tom and family currently reside in Mt. Vernon, NY.
