Executive Director's Message

Greetings to my ICCC family.

As your new Executive Director, I want to thank you for your words of welcome and prayers of support. I am grateful and humbled to be called by God and you to serve ICCC. I look forward to meeting you at our annual conference in St. Louis, July 16-19, 2018 or our regional fellowship events. I welcome your conversations! I look forward to a fruitful and spirited partnership with you as we discern God's continuing call to ICCC on how to serve our members and neighbors, locally and globally.

It seemed providential that one of my first ICCC activities was to participate in the National Council of Churches' Act to End Racism campaign and rally in Washington, D.C. on April 4, 2018. We had a good turnout of ICCC members participating in the rally and enjoyed a great fellowship event after the rally at Park Road Community Church. A big thanks to Rev. Shirley Cooper and ICCC Board Member, Abraham Wright for organizing and hosting this fellowship event.

Awaken. Confront. Transform. Let's ACT to End Racism! This statement was the theme for the National Council of Churches' Act to End Racism campaign and rally. ICCC was founded in 1950

as a powerful symbol of Christian unity and racial reconciliation when the Biennial Council of the Peoples Church of Christ and Community Centers and the National Council of Community Churches joined in a historic merger that represented the largest interracial merger of religious bodies in America. The emergence of ICCC was a public witness to God's love and justice to end racism and to work for racial unity.

The date for the NCC event in DC was chosen because it was 50 years ago on April 4 that Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was murdered in Memphis, Tennessee. Dr. King was in Memphis fighting for the labor rights of African American sanitation workers who were denied better working conditions, pay, and promotions than their White co-workers. A lot has changed in our nation to promote racial justice with the civil rights movements of the 1960s, but a lot has not changed regarding racial equity. As one ICCC pastor recently said to me, it seems like matters regarding racial justice and equity have gotten worse, not better since the 1960's. Since ICCC is a member of the National Council of Churches, I was delighted that ICCC members participated in the Act to End Racism rally on April 4. The National Council of Churches has produced an excellent guide for congregations on how they can address acts of racism -

United Against Racism: Churches for Change. You can learn more about the NCC's Act to End Racism campaign at www.unite2endracism.org. The battle to end racism and the fight for racial equity and reconciliation continues. In such a time as this when acts of racism and violence against people of color are growing in our country, ICCC needs to continue to witness for racial justice, equity and reconciliation in human society.

I know many of our congregations and ministry centers are working to combat racism in their communities. As part of ICCC's history and spiritual heritage, I want to encourage and challenge all of us to reflect on - how are WE continuing to address acts of racism in our communities and nationally? How are WE working for racial justice and unity in our communities? How are WE seeking reconciliation and healing with our brothers and sisters of color? Working for racial equity and unity is a major undertaking, but this mission is part of our call as God's people and as members of ICCC. Let us continue to work to build the beloved community, where there is neither Black, White, Brown, Yellow or Red, but all are one and united in Christ!

The youth will be busy not only greeting old friends and making new ones, but also meeting the "Friends of Jesus". In our time together we will come to know Jesus through the experiences and eyes of those who knew Him best; and realize that He can be our closest and best friend too. We will be spending time in worship while we prayerfully plan our own worship experience to share on Thursday morning. And we will also enjoy and encounter St Louis, the "Gateway to the West"- we will be within walking distance to Busch Stadium, the Gateway Arch, and the Old Courthouse. We'll visit the Old Courthouse, a historical landmark where Dred and Harriet Scott sued for freedom from slavery and Virginia Minor fought for women's right to vote. As a service project, we will work at Greenwood Cemetery (where Harriet Scott is buried), organized in 1874 to serve the needs of the growing black population of post-civil war St Louis area. And, of course, we'll save some time on Thurs afternoon to have fun together.

St Louis is a great city. ICCC is a great community of faith for all ages. Together we can a share, learn, grow, and worship. Don't miss it; this is going to be a great week!
