"ONE OF THE GREATEST EVENTS IN THE HISTORY of Protestantism will take place at Lake Forest when the churches of the Biennial Council of Community Churches and the churches of the National Council of Community Churches come together in one great merging convention." The titles of the messages, lectures and sermons throughout the convention:

"The call of God to us now" delivered by Dr. James Robinson

"Partners in building the world church" delivered by Dr. Raymond Dudley

"Challenge of the church" delivered by Dr. J.W. Decker

"The role of the church in the world to come" delivered by Dr. Robert Hartman

On Saturday the 19th of August 1950 they gathered to "Pledge the Budget" and make the promotion of Christian Community the mission of the International Council of Community Churches.

The following evening the words, "I dedicate the Fellowship of the Biennial Council" by Dr. Joseph Evans and "I dedicate the Fellowship of the National Council" by Dr. Carl Stoll and in that moment was birthed The International Council of Community Churches.

Our ICCC Movement now stands at a crossroad moment in History. Will we continue to be what we are called to be? In our world of "now" we struggle with violence and separation, yet we hold the understanding of "The Beloved Community". Each of us as a part of the whole, holds the answer. In the name of God I pray our answer is Yes."





Executive Director's Message

Mustard Seed Faith

Jesus said, "Because you have so little faith. Truly I tell you, if you have faith like a grain of mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there, 'and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you."

Matthew 17:20

Recently, my wife and I saw the movie, Harriet. The movie is about Harriet Tubman, a slave who escaped and subsequently made some 13 missions to rescue approximately 70 enslaved people, including family and friends, using the network of antislavery activists and safe houses known as the Underground Railroad. When one of the antislavery activists told Harriet Tubman that it was too dangerous for her to travel back to rescue other slaves, she refused to listen. She was more concerned and passionate about freeing other slaves than about her safety. Harriet Tubman returned as a Union spy during the Civil War, leading 150 black soldiers, who freed over 750 slaves.

Often, when I discuss congregational or community change with church or community folks, I hear this response – “we are too small, we are too old, or we don’t have enough resources to make this change.” I understand

some of the reasoning behind these statements but they reflect more a survivalist than a missional position. A change leader is mission driven!

The story of Harriet Tubman powerfully reminds us that ONE person filled with faith, vision, and passion can create a positive difference and change in the world. The bible is full of stories of the power of one, of individuals making a difference for God – Moses, Abraham, Deborah the Judge, Esther, Paul, Peter and the list goes on. There are individuals today in our church and society who driven by their faith, vision, and passion transform our society like Bryan Stevenson, author of Just Mercy and creator of the National Memorial for Peace and Justice, Rev. William Barber, co-Chair of the Poor People's Campaign, and Greta Thunberg, the young climate change activist.

We do not need a lot of people, money or a building to bring about God's transformative change in our congregations and communities. We need people with mustard seed faith, to step up and out, to have no fear (Isa. 41:10) so that we can move mountains to bring about God's kingdom on earth.

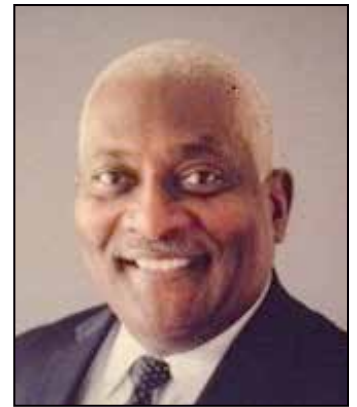

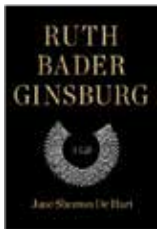

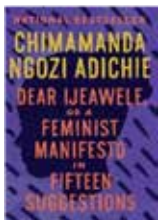


Remembering Women and the Right to Vote

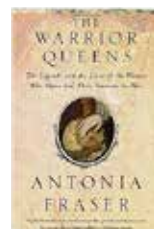

“Seeing Christianity from the Outside” led by Pastor Bruce Jones



Just exactly what do people in today's culture think about Christians and Christianity? The Barna research group has found that many of those outside of Christianity, especially younger adults, think that Christians no longer represent what Jesus had in mind, and that Christianity in our society is not what it was meant to be. This workshop is designed to be a mirror for us to see ourselves and our faith more clearly. It may prove to be a wake-up call to today's church leaders as we accept the challenge of becoming the kind of Christ followers, friends, and neighbors who are full of grace, love, and compassion, in order that the church will be known more by what it is for than what it is against. The goal of the workshop is not only to see ourselves from the outside, but to do something about it, so that the face of Christianity in today's culture will be changed!

“Caring for Yourself When YOU are a Caregiver” led by Dr. Connee Fitch-Blanks

What is revival? Revival is a sovereign work of God—in answer to sincere prayer—in which he: Grips his people with deep conviction, repentance, forgiveness, and deliverance from personal sins; Fills his people with the Holy Spirit and manifesting in them the fruit and graces of the Holy Spirit; Causes non-Christians to honestly seek Him; Ignites in His people, young and old a passion to bring the lost to Christ at home and around the world. Who is responsible for revival? God or Man? Do you work a revival up or do you pray a revival down? What are the conditions of a revival? Man prepares the way for revival after praying to a sovereign God the creator who knows what we need. Everything in creation is under God's control. He has chosen however, to give to his children the privilege of working together with Him to take the good news of His love and forgiveness in Christ to the world. Whatever God tells you to do he will give you the power and ability to do it.

If my people who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways then will I hear from heaven and will forgive their sins and will heal their land. ~ 2 Chronicles 7:14

Fasting is the only discipline that meets all the conditions of 2 Chronicles 7:14. When one fasts he humbles himself; he has more time to pray, more time to seek God's face, and certainly he would turn from all human sin. One could read the Bible, pray, or witness for Christ without repenting of his sins. But one cannot enter a genuine fast with a pure heart and pure motives and not meet the conditions of this passage.

Conference Youth Scholarship

To apply for the scholarship, the following procedure will be used:

- 1 The scholarship is open to any Youth attendee (entering grade 7 through 12) and covers the regular registration fee and Welcome Luncheon.
- 2 Pastors from any member church may submit their confidential nomination for the award with a letter of recommendation introducing the candidate and explaining why they would like this person to receive the scholarship.
- 3 Nominations must be submitted for review no later than March 31, 2020. They should be sent to the Council Office at 21116 Washington Pkwy, Frankfort, IL 60423, attn: Youth Scholarship. Or email to ICCCNOW@sbcglobal.net
- 4 The submissions will be reviewed and presented to the ICCC Board of Directors for approval.
- 5 The ICCC President will communicate the board's decision to the recommending pastor to notify the recipient. The decision will also be announced in the May issue of the Christian Community.

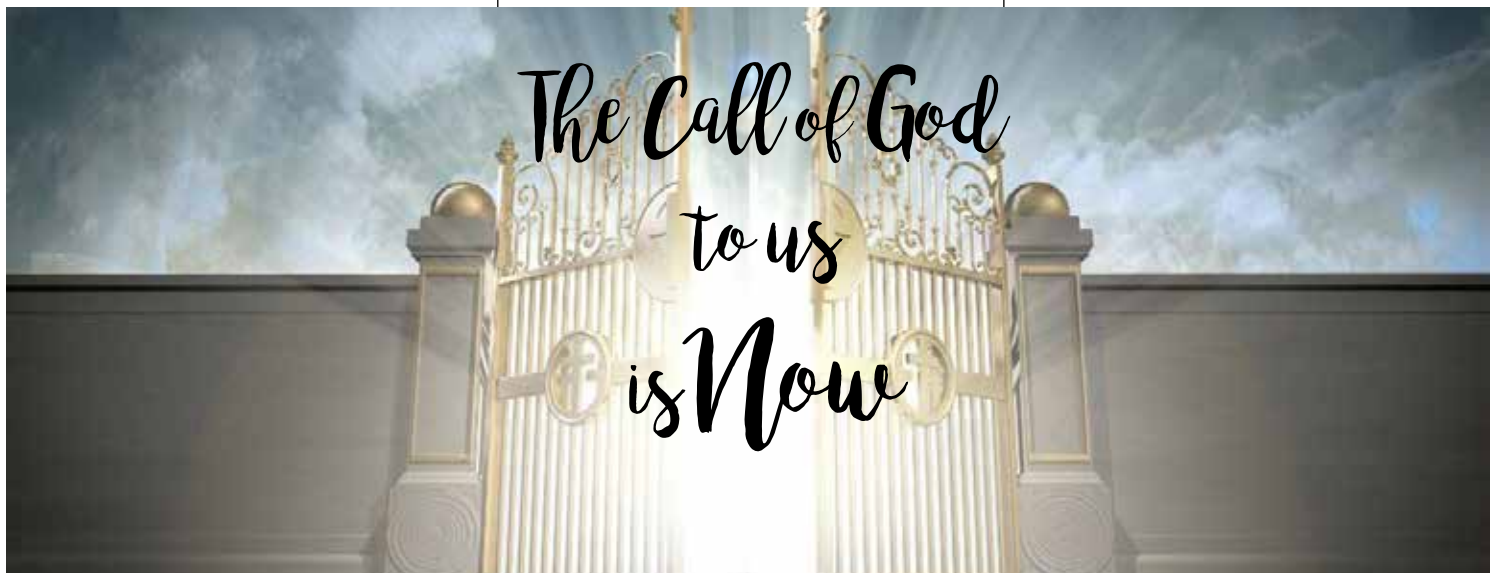
