As people devoted to following Christ, we are committed to community, to treasuring diversity, to living our faith in service and love."

This statement posted on the first page of our ICCC's website describes who the ICCC family is – our family is an international, intercultural, interracial fellowship of Christian churches and ministry centers. Of course, this fellowship includes our clergy, who serve as chaplains or pastors in other congregations. The statement also describes our mission – to seek Christian unity in local, national, and world relationships. ICCC lives out its mission through its membership in the World Council of Churches, the National Council of Churches, Churches United in Christ, Christian Churches Together, and through local ecumenical activities by our members. As members of the ICCC family, we are committed to community, treasuring diversity, and living our faith in service and love.

ICCC is not an institution. It embodies the ongoing Community Church movement. ICCC was created in 1949 as one of the first national interracial organizations to send a clear message to our nation that all of God's people are created equal. ICCC continues to value and welcomes the beauty and diversity of God's family. Amid racial segregation and division in 1949, ICCC also proclaimed that we are all one in Christ.

At its March 2021 meeting, our Board of Directors approved a Membership Growth Strategy plan for this year. The strategy consists of 3 parts: 1) add 12 new congregation/centers members in 2021; 2) plant four new congregations in 2022; and 3) develop several

short videos to promote ICCC's mission and values through various social media. The plan seems simple, but it will require the support of EVERY ICCC member to succeed. We invite everyone to reach out to their neighboring clergy, pastors, congregations, and ministry centers and ask them to join our movement. The best person to share ICCC's mission and values are you!

Our Membership Growth Strategy's goal is not to grow ICCC as an institution but to continue growing and expanding ICCC's mission. Our world, our nation, our communities, and even the Church face significant challenges and divisions. As members of Christ's body, as members of the ICCC family, we are called to work for reconciliation, healing, unity, and value and celebrate the beautiful diversity of God's family.

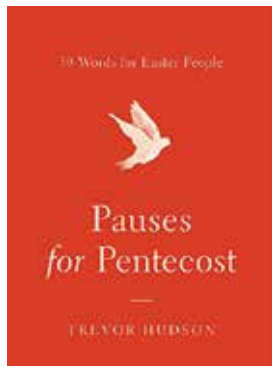


Book REVIEW

Encouraging Our Hope (Romans 15:4)

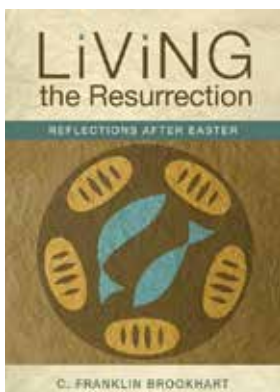
We pray your Easter will be heartening, and we are sharing several books to encourage your walk of faith and prepare you for the season of Pentecost. We pray your reading will be a blessing to you and your family. Be blessed!



Question: how are you going to practice Eastertide this year? Our new normal is changing minute by minute, yet our practice of faith continues. Trevor Hudson, author, *Pauses for Pentecost: 50 Words for Easter People* (2018, 112 pages, Paperback, \$9.99), offers some simple answers to this question and many more. Consider, "How do we live, in the midst of our relationships and daily work, a life permeated by the pres-

ent companionship of the risen and ascended Jesus? What does it mean to be genuinely empowered by his Spirit in a world characterized by painful divisions, immeasurable human suffering, and the relentless devastation of creation itself?" Hudson responds to these questions by exploring the power of words, that is, faith words during Eastertide.

In *Pauses for Pentecost*, Trevor Hudson, a Methodist minister in South Africa, uses fifty words of faith for daily reflection during Eastertide. Just ponder these words: Doubt, Joy, Guide, Love, Encouragement, Power, and Pentecost. Hudson takes a word each day for Pentecost, offers a dynamic Scripture, and then challenges the soul with a reflective question and answer moment to strengthen our faith. Hudson hopes we see that "The Holy Spirit constantly seeks to draw us into fellowship with the Father and the Son and with one another." *Pauses for Pentecost* may be too easy. Still, the power of brevity is appealing and may be excellent for our times.

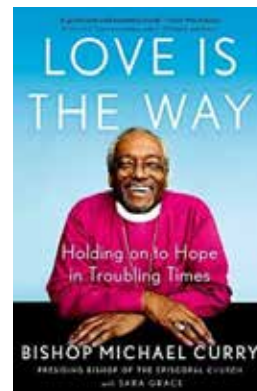


In our virtual platforms, we are becoming more attuned to living in the moment. Conversely, in *Living the Resurrection: Reflections After Easter* (2012, 128 pages, Paperback, \$16), C. Franklin Brookhart presents an engaging discussion on how we are in the moment by living in the resurrection. Brookhart argues that "to ponder the resurrection is to stand at the very heart of the Christian faith."

We have favorite parts of the Bible; Brookhart, however, chooses the resurrection to resolve three issues of our times: (1) understanding the concept of resurrection; (2) dealing with the cynicism of our times; and (3) "How do we live the

resurrection? Or, to use New Testament imagery, how do we conduct our lives as part of the new creation and share in the abundant life Jesus promised?"

In thirteen chapters, Brookhart explores the idea of living in the resurrection. In Chapter Seven, Brookhart looks "at implications of living as a disciple of the Risen Lord." Can we still find meaning in something that seems so evident, so vital to our Christ walk? Brookhart thinks so, especially if we look "at resurrectional responses to human issues, and I hope; as a result, Easter began to loom large in your imagination and understanding." Rather than being pessimistic about our future, Brookhart's work provides an avenue for restoring our souls and our Christian mission with new dynamism.








What do Desmond Tutu and Dolly Parton have in common? Bishop Curry and Sara Grace. Or, more specifically, they both are concerned about dreams. Curry and Grace observe that "the language of a dream is the language of hope. It is the language of reality being changed by a new possibility. It is a miracle progeny of "making do." So in *Love Is the Way: Holding on to Hope in Troubling Times* (2020, 272 pages, Hardback \$17.33), Curry and Grace take us on a journey of love to understand love in our times. In twelve chapters and an action appendix, Curry and Grace illustrate some new insights about how love is a better way for our lives.

The "Appendix: Love in Action—a Daily Planner" is a real gem of this book. Curry and Grace describe the section of the book this way: "To live into our faith and values, we need to bring intentionality and purpose to every day—and that's where what's called a rule of life comes in to support us. Note my language: It supports us. It's not there to constrain you or punish you. It's not going to hit you with a ruler when you're bad. "Rule" is from the Latin *regula*, suggesting a gentle pattern or framework—not a hard and fast rule. This is a way to create tangible habits that support our heart's intentions" (p. 249). If you want to move into a new and supportive way to love, I recommend this book for your journey.

Conference Youth Scholarship

If you know a teen who would like to attend the conference in Dublin, but needs some financial assistance, we have a plan. We have scholarship assistance available to pay for the registration fee of a Youth attendee. To apply for the scholarship, the following procedure will be used:

- 1 The scholarship is open to any **Youth attendee** (entering grade 7 through 12) and covers the regular registration fee and Fellowship Luncheon. 
- 2 Pastors from any member church may submit their **confidential nomination** for the award with a letter of recommendation introducing the candidate and explaining why they would like this person to receive the scholarship. 
- 3 The submissions will be reviewed and presented to the ICCC Board of Directors for **approval**. 
- 4 Nominations must be submitted for review no later than **April 30**, 2021. They should be sent to the Council Office at PO Box 846, Longmont, CO 80502, attn: Youth Scholarship. Or email to ICCCNOW@sbcglobal.net. 
- 5 The ICCC President will communicate the board's decision to the recommending pastor to notify the recipient. The decision will also be announced in the June issue of the Christian Community. The **winning recipient** would be notified soon after the April 30th deadline.

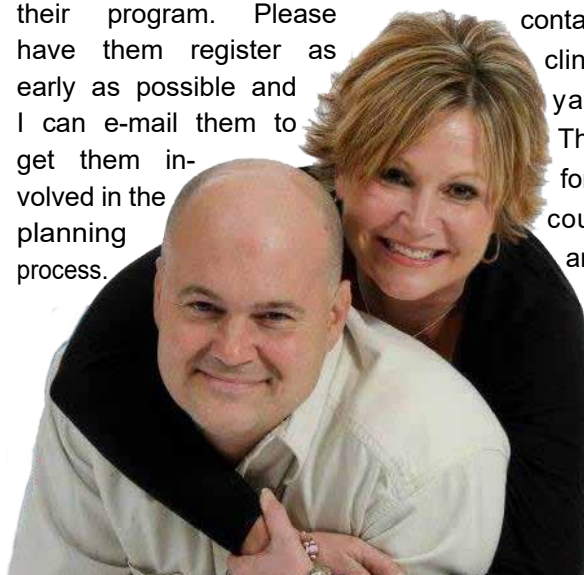

Intergenerational Meal Packaging Event Scheduled at Annual Conference Hotel

For the first time ever, the upcoming Annual Conference is hosting a community service project for all attendees as part of the regular conference agenda. This is something that the ICCC has wanted to do for several years, because it encourages participation and team-building, and helps others in need.

Sponsored by the ICCC Hunger Relief Mission Committee, and in conjunction with an organization called "Rise Against Hunger", conference attendees will package more than 10,000 meals for food-challenged Third World families in only 2 hours' time. What's more, attendees can do this during normal conference hours without having to leave the conference hotel.

Rise Against Hunger has helped volunteer organizations package more than 500 million meals for food-challenged people in 77 countries since its founding in 2005. ICCC member church, The Chapel By The Sea which is located in Clearwater Beach, FL, has sponsored Rise Against Hunger (RAH) meal packaging events for the past 5 years with considerable success.

The meal packaging involves putting rice and other nutrients into single-meal plastic bags for bulk shipment overseas. The process involves no heavy lifting and can be done in street clothes while seated or standing. It can be easily accomplished by volunteers from 6 to 90-plus years of age.

RAH provides all the food and supplies needed for the project. A RAH representative will be on site to help guide us through the process at every step.
