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## Dublin Bound

It occurred to me the other day, that God's very first observation of mankind was our need for community and companionship.

*And God said, "It is not good that man should be alone; I will make him a helper comparable to him," Genesis 2:18*

And after a year of isolation, we understand and appreciate that sentiment more than ever! It is not good to be alone, we need each other.

In Ecclesiastes Solomon tells us, *"There is a time for every purpose under Heaven. A time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck what is planted; a time to kill, and a time to heal...a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing."*

Well, we've refrained from embracing for a long time; often we couldn't even be in the same room. Now we've come to the time to heal and to come together; and what a precious, rejuvenating, healing time it can be. We need this time together.

But just moments ago, as I write this, the CDC eliminated the requirement for masks for those who are fully vaccinated. The situation and recommendations are changing so rapidly, I have no idea what things will be like by the time you read this.

HOWEVER, the good news is that our conference in Dublin in July will be as safe and sanitary as possible. We have talked with the hotel staff, and they have measures in place to make certain that we can participate in the conference activities and focus on our purpose without fear of disease exposure. I was impressed with their sincere concern and emphasis on our health and safety – they have measures in place to address issues I never would have considered.

Check-in and check-out procedures have been expedited. The buffet presentation has been modified to reduce exposure. Common areas (lobby, elevators, etc) are cleaned frequently. Our meeting areas will be sanitized between events. Additional fans are available to improve ventilation in the meeting rooms. Guest rooms will be sanitized and sealed before you arrive.

So fear not; now is our time to come together to celebrate our salvation, worship our God, and give thanks for our many blessings. In addition to inspiring and uplifting worship, we look forward to informative workshops and a great Bible Study with Dr. Payne, a national leader in evangelism and spreading the good news of Jesus Christ.

So now is our time to come together, to be rejuvenated in our faith, and by the end of the week, return home with the confidence to boldly declare, **"Here am I Lord. Send me!"**

**Recently, Harry & Phil sent the following letter. There is still time to donate.**

Dear ICCC Family,

Our ICCC Board of Directors approved a mission partnership with UNICEF to respond to India's disastrous second COVID wave. The situation in India is critical. There is a sudden increase in COVID-19 cases, and it is showing no signs of slowing. This second wave is affecting all, and, in many ways, it is worse than the first one. One major impact is the stress on the healthcare system. UNICEF has been scaling up its response in India to address two specific, urgent needs: access to lifesaving oxygen and additional rapid COVID-19 testing.

ICCC aims to raise \$13,400 to help procure 50 oxygen generator plants and 200 PCR rapid testing machines. The oxygen plants will last for 20 years, and each can provide enough oxygen for a 500-bed hospital. This oxygen is literally lifesaving for critically ill COVID-19 patients. The rapid testing machines will last for ten years and can be used to test for a variety of other diseases as well.

Working in partnership with UNICEF, ICCC can contribute to not only help India weather this storm but we will also create lasting improvements in health infrastructure.

Please submit your contribution to ICCC and earmark it for UNICEF-India. Please note our new address: International Council of Community Churches, PO Box 846, Longmont, CO 80502. Once we receive all contributions, we will send our check to UNICEF to purchase 50 oxygen generator plants and 200 PCR rapid testing machines to support children and families in India.

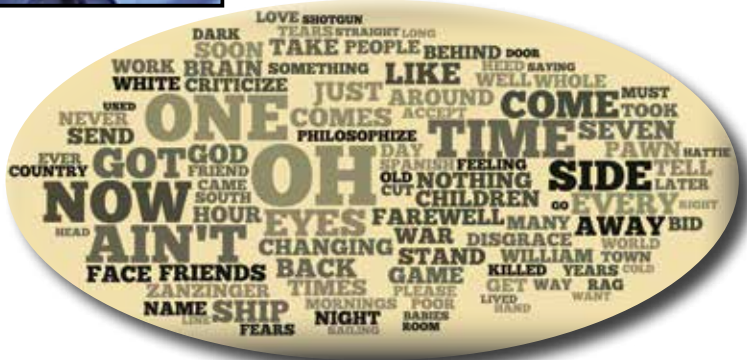

## *"The Times They Are A-Changin'"*



The title of this article comes from Bob Dylan's song that came out in 1963 during the civil rights and anti-Vietnam war movements. The music still speaks to our changing times as Dylan says, "the waters around us have grown...and you better start swimming, or you'll sink like a stone for the times they are a changing."

The title of a recent New York Times article was “After Thoughts: Looking Ahead to A Future Beyond the Pandemic, With Plans and Proposals For A More Fulfilling Life.” The Covid pandemic has turned many of our lives upside down and made us re-examine and perhaps change what is most important in our lives, e.g., faith, family, friends, work.

As our churches reopen post-pandemic, what changes will our congregations have to make? Many pastors have said that their online worship attendance has increased over their regular in-person attendance. As we move back to in-person worship, pastors and lay leaders are wrestling with sustaining their online and in-person congregations! Will people come back to the church building for worship or meetings knowing they can do it via zoom? What constitutes membership if the engaged person lives in another state or another country? Some leaders have questioned whether they

need a physical building and remain a virtual congregation? We all have more questions than we have answers!

“The Times They Are A-Chagin!” Some congregational experts have stated that the pandemic did not manifest these changes; it simply exposed them and perhaps accelerated these changes. A recent national study showed that church membership in the United States continues to decline and has now fallen below 50% for the first time - <https://news.gallup.com/poll/341963/church-membership-falls-below-majority-first-time.aspx>.

I say all this as our society continues to change, our congregations will need to continue to be open to the work of God's Holy Spirit. We need to be adaptive and innovative as we discern how to be Church in a post-pandemic time. We cannot return to the "good old days." As Jesus proclaimed, you cannot put new wine into old wineskins; otherwise, the new wine will burst the wineskin, and the wineskin will be ruined. No, pour new wine into new wineskins, and both are preserved.

If you would like to discuss any of these issues or related issues, I would be glad to convene a meeting time at Conference or set up a zoom meeting to discuss these issues and share what you are doing with your congregations. Take care and stay well!

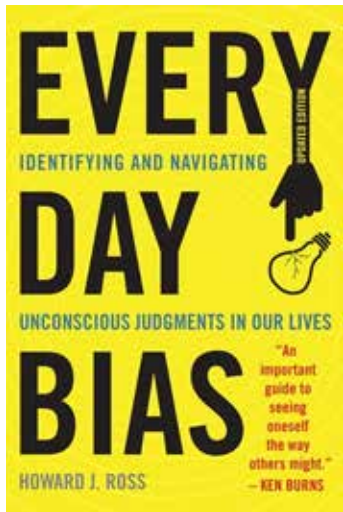


# Book REVIEW

## *Encouraging Our Hope (Romans 15:4)*

It is time for summer and summer reading and reflection. We pray your reading will be a blessing to you, your family, and your community! Be blessed!



Everyday Bias: Identifying and Navigating Unconscious Judgments in Our Daily Lives, Updated Edition, Rowman & Littlefield Publishers (2014), Hardcover: 208 pages, Hardcover, \$25, Kindle, \$14.

Are you biased? For some of us the answer is a resounding no, but for others, the hard truth is we are. In this updated edition of Everyday Bias, author

Howard J Ross provides twenty-five additional pages and insights into the original book. In this edition, Ross updates our understanding of bias in recent times.

Ross makes a profound but straightforward claim: "Human beings are consistently, routinely, and profoundly biased. We not only are profoundly biased but we also almost never know we are being biased."

This claim seems to be absent from the discussion in the latest diversity, equity, and inclusion training and meetings. Ross argues we should include this essential claim in our forums to help the conversation. Ross offers the following reason for considering his view when he writes,

"Science is giving us insights that lead us to conclusions that are very different from those we might imagine possible. And that is my purpose for writing this book. After a lifetime of working on and caring about these issues, I believe these new insights into human consciousness offer us the possibility of a new leap forward. The possibility of a deeper understanding of the human condition that may hold the potential for not only solving some of our specific problems but transforming the way we relate as a species is one I believe must be embraced with vigor."

Ross explores this claim in an engaging introduction, Blinded by the Light of Our Bias and nine chapters: Chapter One If You are Human, You are Biased, Chapter Two Thinking about Thinking, Chapter Three The Many Faces of Bias, Chapter Four, Life, Death and Unconscious Bias on a Rainy Night, Chapter Six, Like Water for the Fish: Networks of Bias in Everyday Life, Chapter Seven Shifting to Neutral: How We Can Learn to Disengage from Bias, Chapter Eight Incubators of Consciousness: Creating More Conscious Organizations, and Conclusion: A Brave New World, A Grand New Journey.

Chapter Two, Thinking about Thinking, is a crucial chapter for understanding everyday bias. Ross uses typical examples and neuroscience to explain the way we encounter prejudice every day. And in his conclusion, Ross explains, "At the core, this book has a single message and it is this: to the extent that you can actually see your unconscious biases and then can see how much they manage your life, you no longer have to be imprisoned by those biases. Even when you notice that the bias is present, you now have the capacity to see yourself as something other than the bias. You no longer have to feel compelled to act as a result of it, nor do you have to be compelled to drive it away through guilt or shame." This point is one of the reasons for reading this book and improving our community.

**Premier Group:** Advanced musicians who have played their instruments for three or more years who can perform advanced string literature.

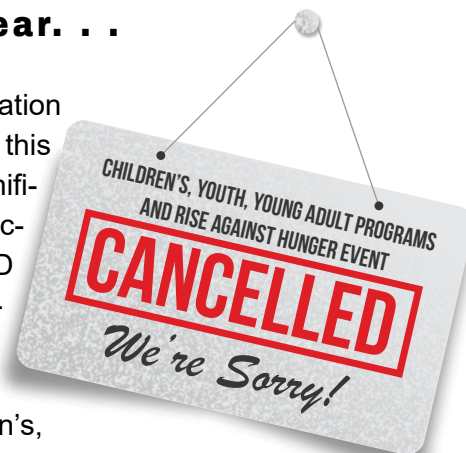

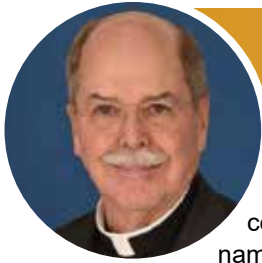

## ICCC Annual Conference Workshops

As always, an important part of the conference will be the opportunity to attend workshops on a variety of subjects. Here is the stimulating line-up being offered in Dublin July 2021.



### *Chaplaincy – The Clinical and the Practical*

This workshop, led by Chaplain John Sugden, is intended to provide a framework to better understand the emotional content of patient conversations, the dynamics of grief and loss and how we honor the patients truth and give it reverence. A review of motivational interviewing and the healing power of listening and bearing witness will be covered in depth.



### *Family Wellness Workshop*

This workshop, led by Chaplain Wendy Childress, is for parents, grandparents, guardians, and children (8 and older). It is designed to provide skills necessary for healthy families. You will learn techniques to assist parents and children navigate their ever-growing and ever-changing relationships. We know that families have good times and bad times. This workshop will provide you with tools and skills to help you go through the hard times as well as the good times. The goal is to learn with your family and other families but also for you to have fun doing so.



### *"We are all Newcomers: A roundtable discussion on being the church in a post-pandemic world"*

This workshop, is guided by Rev. Michael Droege. Before we ever heard of COVID-19 we knew that the way we were doing church wasn't working the way it seemed to work a generation ago. The pandemic forced us to rethink every detail of ministry since how we "did" church was no longer possible. Many of us discovered the heart of our faith community and developed new and innovative ways to be together. Beyond that, we had deep and meaningful discussions on what it means to be the church in the world today. We all have something to contribute to this conversation and you are invited to join this "roundtable" discussion where we explore "what have we learned". Rev. Michael W. Droege is the Pastor of Wilson Memorial Church, a church ministry coach, and adjunct professor of adolescent faith formation at Drew University.



### *We Need a Revival*

This workshop will be led by Rev. Eloise Chrenshaw. What is revival? Revival is a sovereign work of God—in answer to sincere prayer—in which he: Grips his people with deep conviction, repentance, forgiveness, and deliverance from personal sins; Fills his people with the Holy Spirit and manifesting in them the fruit and graces of the Holy Spirit; Causes non-Christians to honestly seek Him; Ignites in His people, young and old a passion to bring the lost to Christ at home and around the world.

Who is responsible for revival? God or Man? Do you work a revival up or do you pray a revival down? What are the conditions of a revival? Man prepares the way for revival after praying to a sovereign God the creator who knows what we need. Everything in creation is under God's control. He has chosen however, to give to his children the privilege of working together with Him to take the good news of His love and forgiveness in Christ to the world. Whatever God tells you to do he will give you the power and ability to do it.

*If my people who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways then will I hear from heaven and will forgive their sins*

Fasting is the only discipline that meets all the conditions of 2 Chronicles 7:14. When one fasts he humbles himself; he has more time to pray, more time to seek God's face, and certainly he would turn from all human sin. One could read the Bible, pray, or witness for Christ without repenting of his sins. But one cannot enter a genuine fast with a pure heart and pure motives and not meet the conditions of this passage.



### *Get Your House In Order: Estate Planning Essentials*

This presentation, led by Mr. John Neil Lindsey, Attorney at Law, will cover some of the essentials of sound estate planning. Topics will include: testamentary will vs. trust, how can one avoid the probate process, common mistakes in estate planning, questions to guide your estate planning, and strategies to help you protect your assets. Is Your House in Order?

## *ABC's of Communing with God thru Prayer, Praise and His Promises*

How, when, why do we pray? Do we believe God hears our prayers?

When, why, how do we praise God?

We are pleased and excited to have Rev. Dr. William Payne as our Bible Study Lecturer this summer!

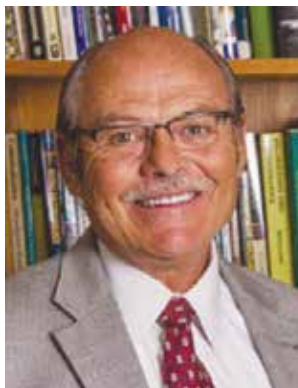

Before retiring, he served as the Deputy Force Chaplain in Iraq and the Military Sealift Command Chaplain in San Diego. Additionally, he pastored a Cuban refugee camp in Panama, served as the community manager for all Reserve Force chaplains, worked as a hospital chaplain, commanded a unit of 17 chaplains and enlisted specialists, and deployed from Okinawa during Desert Storm. He has a military subspecialty code in religion and culture and is a Fleet Marine Force Qualified Officer (FMFQO).

Dr. Payne graduated from Asbury Theological Seminary (PhD Intercultural Studies), Emory University (M.Div.), and Florida Southern College (BA Religion). He is ordained in the United Methodist Church and is a full member of the Florida Conference. He has served the local church as a student pastor, associate pastor, pastor, senior pastor, and interim pastor. During his last pastorate, he planted a large Hispanic ministry that included satellite outposts throughout Tampa Bay.

In addition to expertise in evangelism, world missions, and chaplaincy, Dr. Payne has published widely on early American Methodism, Latin American Pentecostalism, folk religion, and spiritual warfare. He especially enjoys preaching, consulting with churches, and doing inner healing. He developed and directs the chaplaincy study degrees at Ashland Theological Seminary.

**Guidelines:** I've been trying to keep up with the State of Ohio guidelines, and the Hilton branch guidelines in order for our 2021 Annual Conference to be a safe place of fellowship. I don't know about you, but after a year of wearing masks, I still get out of my car heading into a public place and forget it every now and then. The Embassy Suites, the planning committee and I are trying our best not to forget anything. It's definitely been a learning experience, so have patience with us.

We've had many questions, and I am taking this moment to answer what I can. The Embassy Suites is complying with the CDC and State of Ohio guidelines, but also with Hilton guidelines. For an example, if the State of Ohio declares it's safe to be without a mask, but Hilton says to wear a mask, we wear masks. This way you can't tell if I am crabby or talking to myself. ☺ We expect all ICCC attendees to comply as well: masks worn correctly, social distancing, clean hands, etc. The Hilton staff will be doing the same. You can always Google the State of Ohio for any guidelines and statistics you need to be informed.

**Schedule:** Don't be surprised if the schedule looks a little different this year. We've had to adjust because of space limitations. Once it is set, I will post it on the website, subject to change. We are unable to move some meetings outside because it's going to be pretty hot out there in July. But be sure to take a step outside several times during your day to get some fresh air! Sweat a little. If you remember, they have a walking path just across the street. A few meeting rooms have outside doors that can be opened for fresh air and the Grand Ballroom has a fresh air ventilation system that will be running.

**Room Cleaning:** You have a couple of options for the cleaning of your room - the Hilton StayOver Service as they call it. The hotel is not cleaning each room daily for now. If your stay is 4 days or more, they clean on the 3rd day. You can, however, ask them to clean each day, if that's what you prefer. You can also request they don't clean it at all. They are happy to serve you however best you feel safe. The Pool is open, by reservation only. The fitness center is open but you must distance yourself 6ft from others. How many people are really in there anyways? ☺

**Restaurant:** The hotel restaurant, Urban Craft, remains closed and most likely will still be closed when we are there. The bar area is open Wed-Sat 5pm-9pm. The Eatery will add some sandwiches and salads to their supply while we are there. We are also working with the hotel on possibly having some lunches and dinners available, paid pre-order only (with me), for the days we aren't offering a meal option. Watch the website for that info or shoot me an email. I will also include a list of nearby eateries in your registration bag and note if they are open for dine in, or carry out. Uber Eats and GrubHub could be your best friends that week. Speaking of optional meals, our selections remain the same. It's the delivery that will be different. Prepackaged condiments, bottled water, wrapped utensils, covered plates, etc. Only 4 people to a table. There will be water stations throughout the hotel, with wrapped cups, napkins and directions suggesting you use the napkin to touch the machine. Note to self - bring a water bottle. One less thing to touch that isn't yours. The complimentary breakfast will be modified. Pre-packaged self-serve items will be available like fruit and yogurt. Hot choices will be served by an attendant, buffet style.

**Communion:** Communion will be in those cute little prepackaged cups. Offering baskets will be at the front of the room and offering envelopes will be in your conference bags. Don't feel you have to seal the envelopes. And you can always contribute by text, QR code, PayPal, etc. Every way is listed on our website [www.icccnow.org/donate/](http://www.icccnow.org/donate/)

**Elevators:** Elevators only allow 4 people at a time. There are 3 elevators. Allow yourself some extra time when moving around the hotel. And if you remember, these are glass elevators. We can see you, if you squeeze a few extra in!

**Vaccination Card:** As a courtesy to ALL attendees, we ask that you, if you don't mind, show me your COVID-19 vaccination card. I will then give you a sticker to place on your badge. This may put those around you at ease, if they know you've been vaccinated.


