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President's Message **Abraham Wright**

Still at the Cross or Living with Jesus?

What you looking at me for? I didn't come to stay. I just come to say Happy Easter Day.

As a child I heard the recitation above practically each Easter by some small child who was supposedly too young to learn longer recitations. The reception was usually one of laughter, gratitude, and praise for the child's bravery, and especially for the mother's pride; the child was patted on the back and carried that "genuine" smile with him or her for weeks. As an older teen and young adult I noticed that other Easter observances were practically the complete opposite: sad reenactments of the crucifixion as if they were funeral ceremonies with lack of hope, even though the actors knew that the result of the combination of the crucifixion, the resurrection, and Jesus' ascension meant everlasting life. The humor in the child's recitation may have little to do with the underlying meaning of Easter, but it ironically indicated that there is some good news at the heart of the crucifixion and the resurrection.

Don't misunderstand. I too tremble when I think how Jesus was betrayed by the leadership of God's chosen people, how he suffered by shedding his precious blood on the cross as redemption for our sin. But I also rejoice that he rose on the third day and ascended into heaven. The tomb is empty and forever will be. Jesus won victory over Satan, and Death has lost its sting. Then Jesus personally appeared in an altered form for hundreds of witnesses to see him. (including women) to talk to, and to touch him before he ascended into heaven.

So the reenactments of the crucifixion may be an effective anchor of the significance of Jesus Christ as High Priest after the order of Melchizedek, who sits at the right hand of God the Father to serve as Advocate for us with God. However, the crucifixion, the resurrection, and the ascension are the beginning of our journey as believers in the gospel



of Jesus Christ, not the end; so we cannot remain stationed at the cross, stuck year after year in the same place, or falling away in our faith through our diversions, be it unbelief, love of money and other forms of materialism, or other forms of idolatry. Isaac Watts had it right when he said,

> At the cross, at the cross where I first saw the light, And the burden of my heart rolled awav: It was there by faith I received my sight, And now I am happy all the day.

True, the mission of the Church is to carry out the Great Commission, but we need to peel off the "unnecessary baggage" that Christianity entails before we begin that journey. The heart of the gospel is salvation in Jesus Christ: For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life (John 3:16 NIV).

But first, we must have a closer walk with Jesus by submitting our will to God's Will. Being a follower of Jesus is not about titles, dress, long prayers, fire-and-brimstone sermons, and memorizing the entire Bible and quote verses to gain attention. It's about maturing in grace, in knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ (2 Peter 3:18); it's about not making crosses for ourselves, but understanding more about what it means for Jesus to bear, for us, the crosses that come our way; it's about asking God to continuously show us how to honor the debt Christ paid on our behalf in multiple ways in our daily living.

BUT GROW IN THE GRACE AND KNOWLEDGE OF OUR LORD AND SAVIOR JESUS CHRIST. DO HIM BE GLORY BOTH NOW AND FOREVER! AMEN. 2 PETER 3: 18

After orientation, I joined Park Road Community Church. The two questions I was asked were, Do you believe that Jesus Christ is the only begotten Son of God, that he died on the cross and rose from the dead? and will you support this church spiritually and financially to the best of your ability? I was welcomed by the membership. Then, I began to love Jesus more, to move away from the literal cross by observing Christian models and studying and asking questions that got to the heart of what God wanted me to do, by meditating on God's words and Jesus's commands. In short, I learned more how to Live WITH Jesus every day, and to follow his trail-blazing path. The more I keep the image of the cross in my heart, the more I honor God through my behavior toward other believers and my regard for nonbelievers because they too are made in the image of God, the more I recognize that *living with Jesus* is the only path to salvation.

So, we need to recognize God's image first in ourselves, then in others. We need to reflect that image of love each day in our homes and as we go about our daily routine, especially with the people who need our fellowship as encouragement to remain strong in the faith. This further means that we live with Jesus each day and take a dashboard approach to check in with him regularly to see how we're doing, to see whether we are dishonoring the cross or embracing its true meaning. Effective pastors often say that Christians are either retrogressing or progressing; for maturity in Christ means that we press toward the mark of the high call of God, which is in Christ Jesus (Philippians 3:13-14)

I challenge us during this Holy Season to reexamine the heart of the gospel, which is salvation through belief in the death, the resurrection, and the ascension of Jesus Christ, the High Priest in the order of Melchizedek, who is always there to intercede for us, for High reign never ends.

> May the spirit of renewal of our faith in Christ Jesus Filter into our recommitment To live out the gospel of Jesus Christ So that the kingdom of God is present, First in us, then in others Through our intelligent love, Our genuine acts of kindness, And the unity that exists among us Through our love for Jesus Christ.



Executive Director's Message Phil Tom

As we move into April, we continue our Lenten journey to Jerusalem, Calvary, and the emp-

ty tomb. Hopefully, you have utilized our ICCC Lenten devotion and prayer book – 40 Days Toward Life – as we take this season to reflect, reassess and renew our walk with Jesus. Through Jesus' life, ministry, death, and resurrection, we are called to reimagine a new future for ourselves and the life and mission of the Church.

The Word of God never changes, but our society is changing rapidly. Therefore, like every social institution, the Church also has to respond to these changes. During Covid and post-Covid, congregations have mostly moved to provide a hybrid service – in-person and online worship services and programs. However, some smaller membership congregations have decided to remain online because more persons attend worship online than in-person. At the same time, worship attendance nationally has declined to an all-time

low as more persons have left the institutional Church or declared "None" as their religious preference. As a result, thousands of congregations across the country have closed their doors. Congregational leaders have had to become more adaptive and imaginative to new ways of doing ministry to connect and serve their members and neighbors to remain a vital congregation.

These changes at the congregational level have significantly impacted the mission and ministry of regional and national religious bodies like the ICCC, the National Council of Churches, Churches United in Christ, and the World Council of Churches. Therefore, last December 2021, our ICCC Board of Directors

approved the formation of the Reimagine, Re-vision, Reframe (RRR) workgroup to develop a strategic plan to be a blueprint for ICCC's ministry, service, and growth. The purpose of the RRR is as follows: - 1) to look at and assess the past and current situation of the ICCC from the perspective of Council's stakeholders, both active and inactive; and 2) In light of number 1, the RRR group will develop a strategic plan that will, if implemented, secure and enhance the Council's future with current and future stakeholders.


Let us keep these persons in our prayers as they begin their task of imagining a new future for our ICCC family. I know that they would welcome your comments, support, and prayers.



ICCC APRIL 2022 BOOK REVIEW By Rev. Kenneth N. Nelson

Restoration and Revival. Encouraging Our Hope (Romans 15:4)





Undistracted: Capture Your Purpose. Rediscover Your Joy by Bob Goff Thomas Nelson (March 1, 2022) Hardcover \$18.89, 256 pages, ISBN-13: 978-1400226979

As we prepare for our season of Easter and Pentecost, does it seem to you that you may lose your focus along your path? It's not a seasonal moment but are you ready for a new adventure in your Christian walk? Sometimes we, unexpectedly, encounter more doubt than determination.

If this sounds like something you have experienced, then Bob Goff's *Undistracted: Capture Your Purpose. Rediscover Your Joy* may be a passport to restoration and revival.

"If we're not careful, we can trade what could have been a meaningful, joyful, purposeful, and fully engaged life for fitting in, being accepted, or feeling like we are part of the crew. My question to you is this: If your faith is important to you, are you seeking a genuine expression of it or simply admittance to a club? If we want to live intentional lives, we need to decide for ourselves what we really do believe," writes Bob Goff, renowned podcaster and author of the New York Times bestselling *Love Does; Everybody, Always;* and *Dream Big* as well as the bestselling *Love Does for Kids*.

Sometimes distractions hinder our response to excellent opportunities. To this point, Goff observes, "Distractions are not riptides. They are slow-moving currents that will lead you away from your ambitions, relationships, and joy every time" (p. 67). Goff offers us a way to focus our journey. If you like a good story, then get ready to find eighteen chapters filled with relevant Scriptures. In these engaging stories, Goff provides tips for keeping your focus, especially during our everchanging times. Goff remarks, "My hope is that this book will help you find your song or help you sing it a little louder if you already know it. I want my words in these pages to knock loose a couple of verses for you that are filled with love and intention and hope and purpose and Jesus" (pp. 7-8). If your life tank is searching for energy, then *Undistracted* may fill a void.

Goff reinforces his stories with key spiritual truths in our lives. Consider the following: "This book isn't filled with fables. Instead, it's wall-to-wall with stories. Why? It's simple. Because Jesus told stories. In fact, Scripture says He never spoke to anyone without telling them a couple of good stories to illustrate the truths He wanted to pass along. Stories not only tell us truth but they can also point us toward living lives that are more true. Falsehoods are designed to distract us with deceit; truth, on the other hand, informs and guides us down a brave and more lasting path" (p. 8). Goff suggests that finding our spiritual truth lowers distractions and we have a fulfilled life.

In the chapter titled "The Keyhole of Eternity," Goff explains how we have little time to be distracted in life with his story about dealing with life threatening medical challenges. Using Scriptures for the Apostles Paul and James, Goff reminds that our lives are precious and need to be on focus. We simply do not have the time to float along; we must be focused on living like Christ.

In another chapter, "Jesus in the Room," Goff employs Paul's love chapter to challenge us to take an inventory and action for our lives: "Start by naming the purposeful things in your life that will go the distance—things like faith, hope, and love. These are the things Jesus said would outlast everything else. Once you have identified these things in your life, don't stop there; get busy taking aim at them" (p.67). Wait a minute, we say, we are doing this. But Goff confronts our notions with this consideration: "My ultimate hope for us is that we will decide to set sail rather than wait for the right time to untie from the dock" (p. 67). In this moment, we realize where we are and what we must do to be true to ourselves.

Distractions are interruptions; distractions disconnect us from the very things we seek and need. Goff reminds us that "We have to leave behind the assumptions we've made about what we ought to believe, as well as the facts we have ignored and the mistruths we've borrowed from someone else just to belong somewhere. One of the enduring beauties of the message that Jesus came in person to deliver can be summarized in these two words: You belong" (p. 87).

Undistracted offers a powerful and engaging reflection. It is a good read and helps stay on focus in confusing times.

ICCC Announces New Partners

The International Council of Community Churches has never self-identified as a denomination, therefore, has never owned or operated any mission organization, educational institution, pension or insurance board or bureaucratic structures normally associated with denominations. Also, because of limited staff throughout our history, we have been unable to produce certain resources or offer certain assistance needed by our churches. For decades the Council decided to "endorse" many mission and educational institutions, but many of these never had a significant impact on our fellowship nor were supported by our local churches.

The Council has decided to move away from this "endorsed" program, moving forward with a new "partner" paradigm with the hope of building meaningful relationships with a smaller number of mission, education and ministry resource entities which can make an impact on our Council and member churches. With the ICCC building a network of partners, our desire is to find partners which assist member churches in their ministry and mission, while strengthening our common ministry and mission together as a Council.

The ICCC is building relationships with three types of partners: Mission, Education and Ministry Resource. Mis-

sion partners are mission and advocacy agencies which are engaged in meeting certain needs within the human family and developing resources to assist churches in addressing such needs. The ICCC recommends these partners to our churches/centers for financial support and use of their resources. Education partners are institutions which provide educational opportunities consistent with ICCC values. These schools are recommended to our churches for educational purposes and financial support. Ministry Resource partners are businesses that offer to our churches/centers needed resources to accomplish their ministries. All ICCC partners share our common values of diversity, inclusion and pursuit of the common good of humanity. Those partners who self-identify as Christian are ecumenical in practice.

Intergenerational Meal Packaging Event Scheduled at Annual Conference Hotel

This summer the ICCC Annual Conference will host a food mission project for all attendees as part of the regular conference agenda. This meal packaging project will held on-site at the Dublin, OH Embassy Suites, the conference-hosting hotel.

The ICCC Hunger Relief Mission Committee is sponsoring the event, which is supported by the Council leadership. The project's purpose is to help feed struggling families and individuals in Third World countries.

This is an excellent opportunity for conference attendees ages 6 to 90 plus to work together in small teams. The meal packaging involves putting rice and other nutrients into single-meal plastic bags for bulk shipment overseas. The process involves no heavy lifting and can be done in street clothes while seated or standing.

The Hunger Relief Committee is working in collaboration with Rise Against Hunger, a charitable organization that annually provides millions of nutritious, non-perishable meals to food-challenged children and adults in foodchallenged countries. Our goal is to package 10,000 meals—a task that should be easily accomplished in just over two hours.

Rise Against Hunger has helped volunteer organizations package more than 500 million meals for food-challenged people in 77 countries since its founding in 2005. The organization provides all the food and supplies needed for the project. One of their representatives will be on site to help guide us through the process. ICCC's member church The Chapel By The Sea, Clearwater Beach, FL, has sponsored Rise Against Hunger (RAH) meal packaging events for the past 6 years with considerable success.
