

# Reinventing Church?

Recently, I read an article titled "It just doesn't work." The world's best restaurant is shutting down as its owner calls the modern fine dining model "unsustainable." "Hit hard by the pandemic, restaurants have had to re-create themselves over the past few years by accepting takeout orders and reinventing their menus." https://news.yahoo.com/just-doesn-t-world-best-190717289.html?soc\_src=social-sh&soc\_trk=ma

The pandemic has impacted the business model of many industries. The former model no longer works, and different industries are adapting and reinventing themselves to survive, if not flourish. For example, New York City and other cities are working on how to readapt their downtown office buildings for other uses since many workers are not returning to the office.

Several articles indicate that many folks are not returning to worship in-person - https://www.christianpost.com/ news/church-attendance-still-short-ofpre-pandemic-levels-survey.html. Pastors and congregational leaders are acknowledging that they must continue to maintain an online service along with its in-person service. Some congregations have become quite fluent and creative in developing their online service. For some congregations, their worship "attendance" has grown because of their online service, e.g., live-streaming, Facebook, and YouTube. In addition, their online worshippers come from a broader area, e.g., regionally and internationally. Yet, for many smaller membership congregations, maintaining the virtual service presents challenges due

to having members who cannot operate and maintain the technology.

Pastors and congregations are learning on the job how to sustain and integrate their in-person and online congregations. Questions raised are: Is online worship as effective as in-person worship? How do we encourage the participation of online worshippers? Are online worshippers pledging or just spectators? How do we develop community between our online and in-person worshippers? How do we define "membership" if the online worshipper lives in another state or never plans to attend in person? Finally, how do we engage online worshippers to be involved with the congregation's mission projects?

There are probably more questions than answers as the Church reinvents itself in this post-covid period. It will be some time before researchers provide clues to the questions raised in the previous paragraph. As the Church reinvents itself, new models of ministry will emerge.

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


#### **ICCC FEBRUARY 2023**



The theme is "Getting wisdom is the wisest thing you can do! And whatever else you do, develop good judgment. - Pro 4:7 NLT.

Welcome to the 2023 and the Black History Month book review. We pray you, your family, and your congregations have been blessed and will be encouraged in the coming year. This Black History Month let's focus on a bit of the old and some of the new wisdom from our shared faith experience.





Reading Black Books: How African American Literature Can Make Our Faith More Whole and Just by Claude Atcho, Brazos Press, Paperback \$14.99 (208p) ISBN-13: 978-1587435294

In Reading Black Books, Claude Atcho, a pastor and teacher, offers a compelling solution for Christian readers who love theology and black literature but never

seem to find a way for them to meet. Can you imagine having a theological and literary conversation with Ralph Ellison's Invisible Man, and the image of God, Richard Wright's Native Son, and Sin, or James Baldwin's Go Tell It on the Mountain and God? In these opening chapters, the reader begins to see, hear, and feel the dynamic relationship between theology and literature in our time.

Atcho argues that "when we read Black literature's twentieth-century classics through a dual lens—the literary and the theological—we unearth the ways in which God's truth addresses Black experience and how Black experience, as shown in the literature of our great writers, can prod readers from all backgrounds toward sharper theological thinking and more faithful living" (p 1). Readers will find Atcho's approach an enthralling way to read our collective history.

Maybe this Black History Month you are very concerned about racism. Atcho shares his interest in racism through the lens of Nella Larsen's Passing. Drawing from the Norton Anthology of African American Literature, Atcho observes that "Out of all the fiction published during the Harlem Renaissance," Passing offers "arguably the most sophisticated attempt to question the very idea of race" (pp. 91-92). In 1929, Passing viewed many concerns that are relevant to us today. Atcho notes that Passing "questions race and racism by demonstrating that racism is a performative pull that draws all manner of peoples into its orbit and scripts, forcing us to consider the nature of race, the narrative of racial hierarchy, and the stories by which we live" (p. 92). This chapter offers another approach to dialogue and understanding of racism issues through faith and full justice orientation.

On the other hand, maybe you have questions about understanding our times through the power of a lament. Then welcome to the reading of W. E. B. Du Bios,' The Litany of Atlanta. Atcho "demonstrates, the answer, in part, includes a return to the Psalms" (p. 138). It seems that Atcho creates freshness for our souls by sharing his insights into both pieces of literature thus creating an unexpected blessing for readers.

Or maybe you seek a dialogue on the real meaning of justice today through the writing of Richard Wright's The Man Who Lived Underground. Atcho observes that "Wright's novel is the opposite of distraction—it is honest confrontation about injustice. This is freeing and necessary, for to imagine a more just world, one must reckon with the world as it is. The Man Who Lived Underground provides such a reckoning, peering at the world from the land of the rejected, the underground" (p. 145).

In a community that increasingly seems to be losing its attempts to gain hope, Atcho challenges readers with the writing of Margaret Walker. Atcho writes, "There's something deeply stirring about Margaret Walker's "For My People" (1942). It is a poem that soars off the page and bounds across the imagination, evoking, with a marching drumlike cadence, both the plight and the resilience of Black American experience. Read aloud, it sings the harmonies of hope against the downbeat of pain" (p. 159).

Reading Black Books provides the reader with a great way to understand theology and literature. Atcho has chosen some of the most engaging Black writers of all time and then aligns their writing with key theological themes. The reading is compelling and worth the time to read and Atcho provides discussion questions to support deeper reflection and appropriate action for our times.

Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, our ICCC Ecumenical Committee has offered Ecumenical Morning Prayer at 11:00 am ET, 10:00 CT, 9:00 MT, and 8:00 PT Monday through Friday as a centering beginning to the day.

This 20-minute prayer service is based on ancient models of daily Christian prayer and includes psalms, a short reading, silence, and a Taizé chant.

https://us02web.zoom. us/j/82876261449 As I have previously mentioned in past Ecumenews articles, resources from the World Council of Churches 11th Assembly are available on the WCC website, and I encourage you to peruse them. After sharing the Unity Statement and the Call to Act Together in previous months, I would like to now share with you the Assembly's public statements, starting with The Things that Make for Peace; Moving the World to Reconciliation and Unity.

This statement calls for a renewed commitment to peace, following on the life and work of the WCC since the 10th Assembly in Busan, South Korea, was framed as a "Pilgrimage of Justice and Peace: drawing on the "Ecumenical Call to Just Peace" and the Busan Assembly's "Statement on the Way of Just Peace." Recognizing the need for "renewed dialogue within the ecumenical movement," the statement strongly affirms "the commitment of the WCC and its member churches to peace making through inter-religious dialogue and cooperation at all levels," and calls for a global ceasefire, among other actions and commitments.

This statement urges all states that have not already done so to sign and ratify the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons, expresses strong support for a global preemptive ban on autonomous weapons systems ("Killer Robots" and drones), denounces the military industrial complex that profits from the economics of war and violence and the proliferation and export of weapons, and recognizes the right of conscientious objection. The latter insertion into the paper came about as a result of a comment by a peace church representative, made from the floor.

It acknowledges the crises of this time, saying, in part: "We meet in

a time of renewed and escalating global polarization, reconfiguration of governance and geopolitical alignments, division, confrontation, and militarization-as well as of continuing military occupations in situations such as the Occupied Palestinian Territories and Cyprus-with all the appalling risks that attend this context.... Grave concerns are being raised in the ecumenical fellowship about the instrumentalization of religious language, authority, and leadership to justify, support or "bless" armed aggression or any kind of violence and oppression, in sharp contrast to the Christian calling to be peacemakers and contradicting core ecumenical principles.

"We understand that making peace involves addressing racism, xenophobia, antisemitism, hate speech and other forms of hatred of the other (all of which have increased and intensified during these years, in large part encouraged by populist nationalist movements); crisis and competition for essential resources for life; economic injustice and inequality in the marketplace; interstate conflicts and re-emergence of war; and the raising of the specter of nuclear war. These threats to peace fundamentally violate the core tenets of the Christian faith."


## Samaritan Men on the Move

I'm thinking about the name of our ICCC men's group, the Samaritans.

That name immediately brings to mind the Parable of the Good Samaritan. Rereading the story, I am struck by a couple of thoughts. The first is that I am all those men in the story: the "lawyer," an expert in the Law of

God, or in my case, more of a student; "a man," an anonymous man to most people, who is sometimes the

"neighbor" in need and sometimes the "neighbor" who helps; a "robber," at times, of the help/love my neighbors need; the "priest," in my capacity as an ordained pastor, or more inclusively, as a Christian representing Christ; a "Levite," in my daily anonymity as a "lay associate" of the Church; a "Samaritan," who has compassion and acts compassionately; and Jesus, the Christ, who is the compassion of God in me, that I am becoming. They are the facades that we transition in and out of as we try to be true to our true self in Christ.



To become more the compassion of God, I need your help, good Samaritan, and we need each other's help. We are all wounded in various ways. A present opportunity to do so is the Zoom meetings of the Samaritan Men. We have just begun a study of Richard Rohr's book, From Wild Man to Wise Man, Reflections on Male Spirituality. We will continue to meet regularly on the 2nd and 4th

- Rev. Carl Davis, Sr., AL, who is having a heart procedure done early February.


## A special note from Pastor RC Fleeman, Peace Community Church dated 12/6/2022:

Because the devastation was so widespread, clean-up and recovery took a while. Their goal was to be back in their church home by Christmas 2022.



# 2022 ICCC Local Church Mission Grants

For the second year the ICCC offered Local Church Mission Grants to our member churches which are engaged in important ministries of service to their communities. In 2022, we offered three mission grants:

1st Recipient Second Community Church Columbus, OH



Our first recipient was Second Community Church in Columbus, Ohio, for their meal and pantry program. The pandemic resulted in the closure of various community resources addressing food insecurity and needs of the homeless. As a result Second Community through their Board of Christian Education began in June, 2022, to partner with Hoge Memorial Presbyterian Church to address these needs in their community. Second Community provides essential items for a weekly hot meal and non-food items such as hygienic products, blankets, and over-the-counter medications for a pantry serving the homeless and families in need.



Our second mission grant recipient was People's Community Church in Detroit, Michigan, and their Monday Feeding Program. For more than eleven years this program has been providing a hot, nutritious lunch every Monday for 60 to 80 families. The program closed during the pandemic, but re-opened with a bag lunch in October, 2021. In October, 2022, hot meals were resumed.

Our third and final recipient was Church of the Loving Shepherd in West Chester, Pennsylvania and their Food Ministry. The church has offered this ministry for over 20 years and they annually serve up to 47 West Chester area families. Their ministry fills a void as they are the only food pantry in the county that delivers food in support of those with transportation and mobility issues. This ministry is supported by over 30 volunteers who contribute over 70 volunteer hours each month.

We congratulate these three churches on their 2022 grants. All ICCC churches are eligible to apply for Local Church Mission grants. The grant program for 2023 will be announced in early summer prior to the 2023 Annual Conference in Charlotte.

# ICCC Lenten Devotional for 2023

As your church plans for Lent or your pre-Easter period this year, the ICCC is again offering a Lenten daily devotional book.

The 2023 booklet is titled "Our Journey" and focuses on the spiritual journey that is the Christian life.


Similar to last year the devotions follow Scriptures in the Revised Common Lectionary but is usable by churches which do not use the lectionary.



# We are family

The Word Proclaimed by Rev. Dr. Clifford A. Jones



Dr. Jones has been the Senior Pastor of Friendship Missionary Baptist Church in Charlotte for 40 years. Born in Philadelphia and reared in New Jersey, Dr. Jones received his Bachelor of Science degree from Maryland State College; the Master of Divinity and Master of Theology degrees from Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary; and the Doctor of Ministry degree from the Boston School of Theology. As part of his outstanding ministry, he has done further study at Regents Park College in Oxford, England and the Baptist Theological Seminary in Ruschlikon, Switzerland.

In addition to his outstanding ability to explain and deliver God's Word, Dr. Jones has a great and compelling compassion for the needs of others, locally and globally. Dr. Jones led a delegation to form a solid and working partnership with the Winterveldt School in Mabopane, South Africa. The partnership led to the purchase and building of a fully equipped Christian education center for grades K – 12. In addition, a farm was purchased, three greenhouses were built to provide vegetables for sale, and a brick making machine was acquired so that homes and business buildings could be built while also providing a means for economic interdependence.

In response to children and families struggling with severe poverty, Dr. Jones has organized and led numerous medical and religious mission teams to provide needed healthcare, medical supplies and educational training in Jamaica, Africa and Guyana, South America.

In addition to his many global interests and concerns, Dr. Jones is a dedicated supporter of senior citizen programs. His leadership led Friendship Church to open the first satellite center for the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Senior Centers, offering exercise and other classes for seniors living in the area where the church is located. He serves on the Board of Directors for the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Housing Partnership, Inc.

Dr. Jones holds or has held many leadership positions including being a trustee for Morris College and Hood Theological Seminary, Vice President of the Baptist World Alliance and President of the General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. Inc.

The Friendship Missionary Baptist Church has been blessed by God and the exercise of Dr. Jones' gifts and talents with a 115 acre campus. In addition to the church and its facilities, this land is being developed to provided intergenerational daycare, assisted living for seniors, an Alzheimer's center, a hospice house, single family dwellings, offices, a park shelter and amphitheater.

Among the many, many awards and recognitions he has received are "Senior Father of the Year", "Black Fathers Rock," "The Nelson Mandela Award" from the National Baptist Convention in the USA, keynote for the 2007 National Political Black Caucus Prayer Breakfast, the Duke Divinity School – Gardner C. Taylor Lecturer, and the "Beautiful Are the Feet Award," at the Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference.

Published works include "The Star book of Stewardship," "Becoming and Practicing What It Means to Be a Christian," "Consuming Passion: Christianity and the Consumer Culture," and "From Proclamation to Practice: A Unique African American Approach to Stewardship."

There is an age-old arguable saying by Jean-Baptise Alphonse Karr that the more things change, the more they appear to be the same. The implication is that although things may appear to be new on the surface, the fundamental nature or core does not change. So, let's look at the purpose of ICCC Annual Conference: To provide a wellplanned gathering of the ICCC family in a congenial relationship wherein church delegations, members and friends of ICCC congregations at large, and presenters deliver some of the most effective educational and inspirational sermons, Bible Studies, meaningful workshops and variety of music, and genuine fellowship that motivate conferees to take what they receive and go back to their individual congregations and renew themselves in a variety of ways.
