President's Message Abraham Wright

Speading the Gospel

Today, one of the most popular topics in Christianity is what do we mean when we talk about preaching or spreading the gospel. We frequently quote Paul from Romans 1:16: "For I am not afraid of this Good News about Christ. It is the power of God at work, saving everyone who believes-the Jew first and also the Gentile" (LB). This translation is a good start because it uses "Good News about Christ" verses "Gospel of Christ." Yet when we talk of the gospel, too many of us define the gospel as sponsoring a food or a clothing drive or as works of justice and similar activities; though related, this is not guite what that gospel is; these are works of the gospel or implications of the gospel or results of the gospel, not the gospel itself. So, after we directly or indirectly define the gospel as such and get few positive responses, we wonder why we don't have a greater return for the effort we put forth. So maybe it is time to take another look at our definition of the gospel. Then, if you are still unclear about how to define the gospel, think about what the gospel is not. An excellent source with which to begin is American pastor, theologian, and Christian apologist, Tim J. Keller. Keller also is the chairman and co-founder of Redeemer City to City, which trains pastors for service around the world who has revolutionized the way we invite others to become Christians.

Keller and evangelism and mission professors begin defining the gospel by identifying things that the gospel is not. For example, the gospel is NOT religion or irreligion, but a third way of looking at God. The gospel is not a life of love. The gospel is not the result of the gospel, for the gospel is not so much of what we do but the importance of what Christ has already done for us. So there is a general consensus that the heart of the gospel-and strangely enough I heard a part of this preached last week, and the preacher and I had no idea that we were working on a similar topic. In any event, that consensus of the definition of the gospel focuses on three essentials at the heart of the gospel. They are the good news about Jesus' incarnation: the Word became flesh and blood and lived among us; Jesus' substitution on the cross to liberate us from sin so that we might be reunited with the Father; and Jesus' resurrection, which solidifies a seat in the kingdom for all who believe, regardless of rather we are Jew, Greek, Gentile, or of another culture or nation; for the gospel has no boundaries.


Potential believers need to know the story of what Jesus did so they/ we can be inspired to live a life like Jesus's. Paul and the other apostles got into trouble over and over and over again because they told potential converts the story of what Jesus did for the international world and the significance of it; and they repeated that same true story to believers so that they would maintain their faith. So the heart of the gospel is not focused on what we can do but on what Jesus has already done. The gospel is a Jesus movement. Potential converts need an encounter with Jesus, and the works of the kingdom, with appropriate guidance from effective Christian leaders, taking various forms and spreading from there. One of the largest centers of Christianity today is Iran. Another is the global South, especially in Africa, where Christianity is spreading like wild

fire. The focus of the gospel's liberating power, inherited in Jesus's act of substitution on behalf of us, plays a large role in this phenomenal growth in Christianity. Potential Christians must have an encounter with Jesus because it is the strength of that true story that touches, saves, and sustains life.

Throughout this season of the Passion of Christ, let us clarify the origin and the heart of the gospel. Work, without faith in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, its significance and its power, is dead. In too many ways too many of us have taken the best thing Jesus has done for us and turned it into a private, legalized practice wherein we choose what we like and discard the rest-so much so, until the gospel does not look and sound like Jesus Christ any more. But the more we try to alter the genuine good news of the gospel, the more it stares us in the face; for the essence of the gospel will never stop spreading, and it will never die. That's because God is everywhere we go and in the places we don't go, including the public school systems where we think God has been excommunicated.

I pray during this Holy season that we cease circumventing the gospel by trying to redefine what is etched in stone, that we literally and application wise tell others of what the gospel is and is not, and that we closely observe how the work of the gospel, with fruitful leadership, takes its various forms and remains the same salvific gospel that Jesus Christ established through his incarnation, his death/substitution, and his resurrection.

Church Renewal is Possible

A title of an article in the February 5, 2023, issue of the Atlantic magazine caught my eye. The article's title is "Christianity Is Due for a Revival: Our society is secularizing, and Christianity seems to be in long-term decline. But renewal is possible." The article's author is the Rev. Timothy Keller, the founder of the Redeemer Presbyterian Church in NYC, which reaches out to the unchurched. In addition, Redeemer has seeded new church plants across the county. In light of all the articles and research studies about the continuing decline and demise of the Church, Rev. Keller's article is refreshing. I encourage you to read it if you can google a copy or get a copy of this Atlantic issue.

In his article, Rev. Keller suggests the following if we

want Christianity to grow again in the U.S. The Church can grow if:

- 1) It learns how to speak compellingly to non-Christian people.
- 2) It learns how to unite justice and righteousness.
- 3) It embraces the global and multiethnic character of Christianity.
- It strikes a balance between innovation and conserving historic Christian teaching.
- 5) It helps people understand the emptiness of modernity, individuality, and self-liberation vs. God's grace and covenantal relationship.

I confess I am not doing justice to Rev. Keller's article since I only highlight his themes. However, he provides more details in his article about these themes and the challenges faced by the Church in embracing these themes. For example, he says that established majority-white congregations often welcome people of color or other ethnicities to grow their numbers but don't always open the doors of power and leadership to them.

Whether you agree with Rev. Keller's theological perspective, reflecting on these themes would be a good exercise for your congregation leaders and members to discern how they address them. Finally, Rev. Keller says these factors will not necessarily trigger a renewal. This work must be accompanied by "extraordinary

prayer," accepting moral absolutes however unpopular, and not be captured by any political project.

Food for thought!

So, let us not dwell and despair about the negative news about the "Church" but refocus our vision and energy on how God can use us to grow God's beloved community. Renewal is possible! Some congregations are growing and experiencing spiritual vitality, like Imagine Church of the Carolinas led by Rev. Bruce Jones in Charlotte, N.C. Imagine Church of the Carolina will be hosting us for our 2023 Annual Conference in Charlotte. So, as we are in the season of Lent, let us remember and celebrate the good news that God can make a way out of no way!



The CUIC Academy of Ecumenism



Churches Uniting in Christ (CUIC) is pleased to announce the launch of our new Academy of Ecumenism, and we are now accept-

ing applications. While existing programs focus attention and resources on ecumenical formation on a global stage, there are no existing programs that are ecumenical in nature within the United States. To bridge that gap, CUIC has created the CUIC Academy of Ecumenism. Young adults chosen to participate will be trained in current group leadership skills, the history and theology of the Ecumenical Movement, and the particular connections among the CUIC Member Communions, Christian unity, and interreligious relationships.

This small cohort of young adults will be between the ages of 25 and 34, will represent our 10 CUIC Member Communions, and may be either lay or clergy. Those chosen must be able to commit to 10 months of training, travel to a single in-person gathering in the United States, have access to a phone and the internet, and be willing to organize and lead a ministry project in their local context.

Two (young adult) participants will be selected from the International Council of Community Churches to participate in this ten-month training, and applications are due by May 15, 2023. 




ICCC MARCH 2023 Book REVIEW By Rev. Kenneth N. Nelson

The theme is "Getting wisdom is the wisest thing you can do! And whatever else you do, develop good judgment. - Pro 4:7 NLT.

This month I wanted to draw selection from various webpages for more discovery and I highlight some books that caught my attention and may be of value currently or historically. Either way, I pray you are blessed.






Between Sundays: Black Women and Everyday Struggles of Faith. By Marla F. Frederick. University of California Press, 2003. 263 pp. Kindle, \$3.95; Cloth, \$75.73; paper, various from \$14. to \$34.95.

According to Contemporary Sociology, "This wonderfully written book gives voice to women whose lives and actions

may have gone unnoticed outside of their small rural community. Between Sundays is an excellent book for anyone interested in race and ethnic relations, black feminist theory, women and gender studies, religion and religiosity, class, rural studies, and activism, and how they intersect. It is rare to find a work as finely written as this and it puts a human face on so many sociological concepts and categories."

Some other reviews challenge Frederick's work by suggesting that the content, in some areas, is not as critical as it should be and more explanation about themes and data must be drawn. While this may be true, Between Sundays may be an excellent resource for Women Fellowship and young women of faith who are trying to find connections with faith, family, and life. When I recall the faith of my mother and aunts, Between Sundays helps me to realize how their faith enabled them to press forward in difficult times. The lessons from this book could be a path for understanding women of faith anytime.



With nearly a million copies sold, Joanna Weaver's popular book shows women how to blend intimacy with Jesus and service for Him.

An invitation for every woman who feels she isn't godly enough... isn't loving enough... isn't doing enough. The life of a woman today isn't really all that different from that of Mary and Martha in the New Testament. Like Mary, you long to sit at the Lord's feet... but the daily demands of a busy world just won't leave you alone. Like Martha, you love Jesus and really want to serve him... yet you struggle with weariness, resentment, and feelings of inadequacy.



2023 ICCC/WN Africa Mission Project By Rev. Bob Fread

VP for Informational Services and Outreach

In the last several years the world has focused on COVID and the war in Ukraine, while ignoring how climate change was continued to cause severe famine in several parts of Africa. This year the ICCC would like to bring attention to this ongoing crisis and along with our mission partner, World Neighbors (WN), help bring needed famine relief and agricultural development support to Africa through our 2023 ICCC/WN Africa Project.

Despite contributing the least to global warming and having the lowest emissions (3.6% of the global total), Africa is the most affected by climate change. World Neighbors (WN) has been working in East Africa for over 25 years, currently in: Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania and Malawi- implementing seven programs reaching over 200,000 beneficiaries. WN is responding to the situation by empowering communities to develop climate change adaptation strategies. This involves working jointly with the communities to develop and implement integrated adaptive mechanisms to enhance resilience and adaptive capacity to climate change in order to increase food security, improve nutrition, increase incomes, and facilitate them to practice sound environmental stewardship. The integrated approach will address the interface between climate change, agriculture and incomes. This will include disaster risk reduction to address the current climate risks and build capacities for longer-term adaptation of the vulnerable communities.

World Neighbors is at work, also, in the west region in Burkina Faso. The overall objective of work there is to strengthen the technical capacities of the beneficiaries by popularizing good agricultural practices adapted to climate change (Indigenous Soil and Water Conservation techniques: erosion control, composting, Zaï pits, half-moons, Assisted Natural Regeneration), supporting communities engaged in soil restoration actions, supporting communities in the development of dry season crops through market gardening or small-scale irrigation, and promoting the use of improved early or drought-resistant seeds.

Our hope is that each ICCC congregation will consider making a gift to this international mission project sometime



in 2023. Donations should be sent to the ICCC office. This is the third year that the ICCC has sponsored an international mission project with our 2021 project supporting COVID relief in India and 2022 aiding the global distribution of the COVID vaccine.
