If Easter Has Come and Gone, What's Next?

Today, some of us are saying, "Easter has come and gone." If this is true, the logical question is, what happens next? Others are echoing a similar idea: "Since Easter has come and gone, we now move to the next event on the National Church calendar." Yet, others are saying, "Easter has come, and it is still with us in the Church and in our everyday lives." I, hold the latter of these three notions.

If the outcome of Easter does not compel us to examine the effects of the 40 days of observance of Lent, of fasting and praying and meditating and reading of Scriptures and genuine participation in other meaningful activities, then why did we spend the time doing so? If the observance did not produce a renewed commitment to the gospel of Jesus Christ that strengthens us and ultimately the life of the Church—a life of spreading the gospel of Jesus Christ and practice using it in our everyday lives-why observe Lent? Why deprive ourselves of needed sleep on Easter morning if the participation in Sunrise services and/or Resurrection services are just formalities? Why have Jesus get up from the grave, reminding us of how His rising from the dead collides with sin and ultimately humiliates Satan in a landslide victory of eternal life over death, for us to casually say, "Hallelujah, amen; it's over"? Jesus got up so we could get down. Down to the genuine mission of the Church, that is, to follow Jesus' lead and live the new life given to us through Jesus's death and resurrection.

If we could take what we gleaned during the 40 days of Lent and Easter observance and just do a few things differently, think of how transformed our lives would be. We are talking about worthy, actualized commitments such as arriving at church or watching the online worship service on time; giving warm welcomes to individuals who visit our churches and making them feel like they are genuinely a part of the family of God; reporting (during conflicts) accurate information concerning others instead of derailing them primarily for self-gain; preparing well for committed tasks we are aware of far in advance instead of waiting until the last minute then fall with broken wings instead of flying like eagles. Again, we are talking about worthy tasks such as praying on a continuous basis for strength to resist and to reduce the consumption of too much sugar, too much salt, too much sodium and cholesterol, too much alcohol, too much social media, too much "church swapping," and cease substituting our mission for the central mission of the Church.

And what about activation of some of those plans that have been in the incubation stage almost from our They include activating inception? the notion that God has already gone ahead of us and prepared the way-we need to walk beside him as he walks beside us in completing what He has already started; not waiting until we become rich or win the lottery before we make financial contributions to the church; admitting through action that we do know the guidelines for financial giving and that we give as God blesses us; visibly demonstrating that God calls us to be leaders, not celebrities; modeling for others that God calls us to a committed Christian life, a life in which we are clear in our thinking and guided by the Holy Spirit that does not

allow us to demonize groups based on the action(s) of one or two members, for there are rotten fruits in almost every group, including those in our churches; reaching across denominational/ communion lines in sharing and receiving resources and adapted programs that facilitate the spreading of the gospel and thus help to transform ourselves and our communities into "healthier" beings and places; putting forth intentional efforts to see the good in people and to remember Paul's word in 2 Thessalonians 1 that Jesus Christ is Lord, and he repays those who do evil with everlasting isolation and rewards those who are faithful, including those who endure persecution, with eternal life.


So in the transformation of our lives, during this post-Lent and Easter season, especially regarding the command to follow the guidance of the Holy Spirit every moment of our lives, I can think seriously of no better conclusion to this message except to remind us of the transformation of the late Marion Bascom, an ICCC African American pastor in the Baltimore, Maryland area; the late Robert Taylor, an ICCC pastor of euro descent from the Columbus, Ohio area; and the late Bob Puckett, an ICCC pastor of euro descent from Norris, Tennessee.


During the late 1980s and mid-1990s when a large number of pastors, especially several African American leading clergy in the Consultation on Church Union (CUIC) communions, adamantly resisted the notion of

I Won't Shut Up: Finding Your Voice When the World Tries to Silence You by Ally Henny. Baker, \$24.99 (224p) ISBN 978-1-540-90265-8

In her impassioned debut, Henny, vice president of a Black Christian collective, motivates readers to "talk back to [racial] injustice" in a culture where Black women are criticized for everything from their hairstyles to "taking up more space than white people... think you should." The author

recounts her childhood in a small, predominantly white Missouri town where she was lauded for academic achievements, but nevertheless faced racism from classmates. As an adult, she attended a largely white church where it became clear that even when racism is acknowledged, it's often done in a way that serves the majority: despite "passionate declarations against racism that could elicit hearty 'amens'", insidious marginalization in church culture went undiscussed. She explains that using one's voice can take different forms, from calling out racism in everyday life to advocating for change on Capitol Hill. And while readers might meet pushback, they shouldn't let others' feelings silence them, though Henny acknowledges that having to leave once-welcoming spaces (such as a church) due to racism or microaggressions can still feel like a loss. Throughout, Henny is candid about her own path to self-acceptance— "I wasn't always as outspoken about my loudness, my Blackness, or my womanness"-and her discussions of how racism can manifest in overt and subtle ways, from the church pew to the classroom, are smart and perceptive. The Resilience Factor: A Step-by-Step Guide to Catalyze an Unbreakable Team by Ryan Hartwig, Léonce B. Crump Jr., and Warren Bird. IVP, \$18 trade paper (156p) ISBN 978-1-514-00568-2

Business consultant Hartwig (*Teams That Thrive*), pastor Crump (*Renovate*), and church researcher Bird (*Better Together*, coauthor) offer sensible advice for building professional teams that can tackle unexpected challenges. Resilience doesn't develop

through superficial team-building exercises, the authors write, it must be forged through the "pursuit of a shared purpose" and a focus on faith. First, it's important for teams to discuss the broader goal that the organization is fighting for, which can be easily forgotten amid day-to-day work routines. Once that's done, they should craft a charter that outlines their purpose, working norms, responsibilities, and accountability structure. It's also worth inventorying each member's skills and brainstorming how to harness them. And rather than leaving

it all to top-level leaders, resiliency work should involve all employees, as each can exercise leadership skills, push colleagues to improve, and hone mutual respect rooted in Christian values. Drawing on solid business principles, the authors take a practical stance toward team unity and dispense plenty of brass tacks advice, much of which applies regardless of faith, whether on meetings (conduct only when necessary), deliverables (create team accountability systems) and evaluations (develop regular "after-action reviews" to assess projects). Christian leaders looking to refresh their organization's approach will want to check this out. (Reviewed on 04/14/2023 by Publisher's Weekly and due for release on June 20, 2023.).



We Heal Together: Rituals and Practices for Building Community and Connection

Michelle Cassandra Johnson. Shambhala, \$19.95 trade paper (224p) ISBN 978-1-64547-107-3

In this uplifting if flawed entry, activist Johnson (Skills in Action) calls on readers to address ancestral trauma and communal pain through spiritual rituals. Drawing from Buddhist tradition, feminist theory, and her own anti-racist work, the author asserts that, since "when

any living being suffers, we all suffer," humans must work toward a more just world for others as part of their own healing. Johnson delves into the link between grief and liberation (releasing unprocessed grief can unburden the soul), finding joy in the midst of suffering, and the importance of learning about one's ancestors, particularly for readers of color. Spiritual rituals follow each chapter, and include journal prompts ("If I hold trauma in my body from my lineage, where is it showing up and how does it feel?"), yoga practices, and relaxation techniques. While the meditations on the power of community grow repetitive and there's a surfeit of overly long recollections of retreats she's led, readers will appreciate the author's detailed, actionable ritual suggestions and strong social justice principles. The spiritually inclined will find some wisdom here if they're patient. (Reviewed on 03/10/2023 by Publisher's Weekly and due for release in April 11, 2023).

Week 2, May 13 – Review 1023 application - 501 (c)(3)

Week 3, May 20 – Types of grants – governmental grants, private foundations/corporations, etc. (Review written state-funded grant)

Week 4, May 27 – Grant management (After you're funded, what then?)



We want to equip one of your members to write grants for your congregation or center. In addition, we want your congregation or center to learn how to expand your resource base so that you can continue to serve your congregation and community faithfully.

having hands laid upon all ordained clergy in a national service for the Consultation on Church Union as an act of reconciliation of ordained ministers as one in the body of Christ. They believed that the act was an insult because it represented "re-ordination." To the contrary Bascom, Taylor, and Puckett (not representing the trinity) made a public agreement to support what the Holy Spirit was saying to the churches: they willingly pledged that they would gladly welcome each other's blessing by laying "holy" hands on each other. They further pledged that in honor of brotherly love and racial reconciliation, they would live each day as brothers, and that whichever one preceded the other to the Larger Life, the one who survives would preach the other's eulogy. Taylor preceded Bascom and Puckett, and Bascom delivered Taylor's eulogy; Bascom followed Taylor, and Puckett was one of three eulogists; when Puckett passed, several of us eulogized him and raised the three from "the dead" by modeling their examples to this day.

So instead of the refrain, "Easter has come and gone," let us respond positively to the Holy Spirit, in whichever area our churches need us to respond, by making an intentional commitment to submit to It and let It guide us during this "Easter Will Forever Be with Us" season.

Shane Claiborne is a prominent speaker, activist, and best-selling author. Shane worked with Mother Teresa in Calcutta, and founded The Simple

Way in Philadelphia. He heads up Red Letter Christians, a movement of folks who are committed to living "as if Jesus meant the things he said." Shane is a champion for grace which has led him to jail advocating for the homeless, and to places like Iraq and Afghanistan to stand against war. Now grace fuels his passion to end the death penalty and help stop gun violence.

Shane's books include Jesus for President, Red Letter Revolution, Common Prayer, Follow Me to Freedom, Jesus, Bombs and Ice Cream, Becoming the Answer to Our Prayers, Executing Grace, his classic The Irresistible Revolution, Beating Guns, and his newest book, Rethinking Life (released Feb 2023). He has been featured in a number of films including "Another World Is Possible" and "Ordinary Radicals." His books have been translated into more than a dozen languages.

Shane speaks over one hundred times a year, nationally and internationally. His work has appeared in Esquire, SPIN, Christianity Today, TIME, and The Wall Street Journal, and he has been on everything from Fox News and Al Jazeera to CNN and NPR. He's given academic lectures at Harvard, Princeton, Liberty, Duke, and Notre Dame.

Shane speaks regularly at denominational gatherings, festivals, and conferences around the globe.
