# FUTURE CONFERENCES IN JEOPARDY The existence of the ICCC Annual Conference is at stake due to penalty expenditures

Most of us who regularly attend the Annual ICCC Conference place Jesus Christ at the heart of the event; others of us who attend Annual Conference quite often regard the event as the center of our existence with each other; yet others consider the two events as one. To exist with one and not the other is heartbroken for most of us; it would be the loss of much of our quality lives, long established by meeting together "live" in Annual Conferences. In practical reality, this life that we genuinely live through Annual Conference is closer and closer and closer to abandonment if we fail to do something immediately to concretely sustain it with genuine and financial support to further the work of reconciliation of the body of Christ both within ICCC and the larger body of Christ.

So now is the time to act prudently. Otherwise, the demise of a life gathering annually for 4-5 days of sharing oneon-one in meetings and inter-family assemblies with excellent sermons, bible studies and follow-ups that are relevant to personal and home-church settings and elsewhere, with music that touches the very soul of the group, with workshops and other offerings related to work and study, with a mission focus and personal growth activities, together with further connections for personal and professional studies, and available opportunities to keep the relationships active from year to year by participating and by contributing to it.

It costs approximately \$1,000 to sponsor a 4-day Annual Conference for each individual including registration, room night requirements, and paying for rentals such as electronic equipment and an assessed percentage on purchase of food for group use and on rental equipment. Each year the hotel site is booked in advance. However, for the past three years the Council has paid an overbalance of \$30,000 - \$40,000 in penalty expenditures because the Council did not meet its hotel requirement for food or beverage or a combination of the two. When the hotel nights and the food and beverage requirement are not met, the Council/ Conference pays for the use of hotel space for programming. However, the Council can no longer afford to absorb such costs. So the essential question is, Does the Annual Conference of the International Council of Community Churches continue to live and with a network of our love and our support, or does it perish?

I pray that you pray with us that the Annual Conference of the International Council of Community Churches continue to reflect more seriously **now** on this issue, use a new frame of mind with clearer lens and sincerely frame the question of how can we as agapebonding Christians use the bulleted points to the right or a combination of refraining questions that we have already asked silently but was not invited to ask aloud and ask ourselves, "What if we do all that we can do in time and on time, and let God freely do the rest?"

PRAY THAT GOD WILL CONTINUE TO TOUCH ALL OF OUR HEARTS AND MINDS TO DO THAT WHICH WILL ENABLE THE COUNCIL TO THRIVE, ESPECIALLY DURING AND AFTER THE 2024 ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

#### Churches Need to Lift Up Christ and Not Itself

When I engage with a congregation which is struggling and totally focused on how to sustain its institution, I often ask the hard question, where is the fire and focus on fulfilling God's mission and calling to you! Sadly, too many congregations are focused on institution maintenance and survival rather being a missional Church.

In a recent email to his congregation Rev. R.C. Fleeman, the pastor of Peace Community Church, Ft. Myers, FL., posted the following quote by Dr. Leonard Sweet -

Pew Research Center is one of the most reliable and reputable sources of information on religion in the United States. Pew finds that as of 2019, 65% of American adults described themselves as Christian, down 12 percentage points over the past decade. The 2020 data shows 64% Christian identity. In other words, every year the Christian faith is being abandoned by 1% of the U.S. population. This is more than a "steady, rapid" decline. This is a precipitous plummet.

In summary, the percentage of American adults identifying as Christian dropped from 77% in 2009 to 65% in 2019 to 64% in 2020. (See Pew Research Center, "In U.S., Decline of Christianity Continues at Rapid Pace" (October 17, 2019).

"The road to obsolescence is paved with status quo," as someone once said. Maybe it's time for the church in the U.S. to lift up Christ and not itself?" As the CHURCH is wrestling with how to navigate our new social and increasing secular context, perhaps the CHURCH may experience a new reformation where we reclaim our mission and refocus on developing new disciples to carry out God's mission of compassion, justice and peace in the world, rather than spend our energy on how we can sustain or increase the 3 Bs-buildings, budgets and butts in the pew!








Black History Month evokes various meanings in every segment of our community of faith. Some focus on the diverse contributions to fiction; others concentrate on nonfiction and poetry, and




**King: A Life** by Jonathan Eig. Farrar, Straus and Giroux, \$35 (688p) ISBN 978-0-374-27929-5

Martin Luther King Jr. went beyond meek nonviolence into far-reaching radicalism, according to this sweeping biography. Eig (*King: A Life*) gives a rousing recap of King's triumphs as a civil rights leader—the 1955 Montgomery bus boycott, his "I Have a Dream" speech at the 1963 march on Washington,

the 1965 procession from Selma to Montgomery, Ala.—as well as his despondency later in the 1960s as his anti-poverty campaigns struggled and Black energies drifted from nonviolent protest toward armed militance and "Black power." Contesting accusations by Malcolm X and others that King was an "Uncle Tom," Eig casts him as a revolutionary who reshaped the South with his integrationism, became an outspoken opponent of the Vietnam War despite losing political support and drawing the ire of the FBI, and developed a deep critique of systemic racism and economic inequality that called for reparations for slavery and a guaranteed minimum income. King is no saint in this complex, nuanced portrait—his plagiarism and womanizing are probed in detail—but Eig's evocative prose ably

conveys his bravery, charisma, and spell-binding oratory (rallying the Montgomery boycotters, "he called out in his deep, throbbing voice, and the people responded, the noise of the crowd rolling and pounding in waves that shook the building as he built to a climax"). It's an enthralling reappraisal that confirms King's relevance to today's debates over racial justice (*Publishers Weekly, May 2023*).




**Howard Thurman and the Disinherited: A Religious Biography** by Paul Harvey. Eerdmans, \$28.99 (256p) ISBN 978-0-8028-7677-5

Harvey (Bounds of Their Habitation), professor of history at the University of Colorado, offers an illuminating account of the life and legacy of Howard Thurman (1899–1981), the grandson of a slave who became a well-known preacher, teacher, author, mystic, and mentor to

a generation of civil rights activists. Harvey recounts Thurman's drive for educational advancement despite numerous obstacles his hometown of Daytona, Fla., lacked a high school for Black students—and the learning and leadership opportunities he pursued at the YMCA, Morehouse College, and Rochester Theological Seminary. Later chapters cover Thurman's six-month trip to India in 1935 as part of the American Christian Student Movement's "Negro delegation," during which he met Gandhi; his career as dean of the chapel at Howard University and, later, Boston University; and his efforts to establish an interracial church in San Francisco. Harvey astutely unpacks the development of Thurman's understanding of Christian faith, which was greatly influenced by the spirituals and Quaker thought, defied Baptist orthodoxy, incorporated mysticism and pacifism, and led to his seminal work, Jesus and the Disinherited, which influenced Martin Luther King Jr. This should go far to raise the profile of a lesser-known spiritual leader whose writings, sermons, and mentorship helped lay the foundation for the civil rights movement. 

#### Help Give Foster Children Hope

To whom much is given, much is required. Luke 12:48



The ICCC Missions Committee needs your congregation's help with the Foster Children backpacking event to be held at the 2024 annual conference for children entering foster care in Kansas City. We are asking your congregation to sponsor as many backpacks as you can support; this campaign request ends February 28, 2024.

Each year 220,000 children in the U.S. with an average age of just 7 ½ are hastily removed from unsafe home living conditions and sent to a foster care facility; more than 12,000 of these children live in Missouri. Each child has just a few minutes to stuff their personal belongings into something handy, typically a trash bag, before going to foster care. It's a traumatic experience that you can help make easier by donating comfort cases for up to 200 Kansas City, Missouri youngsters at this year's Annual Conference.

What is a Comfort Case you ask? It is a backpack or duffel bag, filled with age-appropriate essentials such as pajamas, blanket, socks, a cuddle toy, dental kit, personal grooming - hygiene items, book, pencils, etc. When a child is removed from his or her home due to a traumatic event, the Comfort Case is given to the child to eliminate the demoralizing practice of placing his or her belongings in trash bags at this very stressful time in the child's life

Our goal is to sponsor 200 backpacks at a cost of \$55 each to be assembled at Conference and delivered to the Kansas City Missouri Social Services/Police Departments specifically for foster children.

# The ICCC Welcomes Back THE REV. DR. LEAH D. SCHADE

# as the 2024 Annual Conference Bible Study Leader and Keynote Speaker!

The Rev. Dr. Leah D. Schade is the Associate Professor of Preaching and Worship at Lexington Theological Seminary in Kentucky. An ordained Lutheran minister (ELCA) for more than twenty years, Leah earned both her MDiv and PhD degrees from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia (now United Lutheran Seminary). She has pastored congregations in suburban, urban, and rural contexts. Her book, *Preaching in the Purple Zone: Ministry in the Red-Blue Divide* 



(Rowman & Littlefield, 2019), explores how clergy and congregations can address controversial social issues using nonpartisan, biblically-centered approaches and deliberative dialogue. She is also the author of *Creation-Crisis Preaching: Ecology, Theology, and the Pulpit* (Chalice Press, 2015), as well as For the Beauty of the Earth , a Creation-centered Lenten devotional(Chalice Press, 2019). She is co-editor and author with Margaret Bullitt-Jonas of *Rooted and Rising: Voices of Courage in a Time of Climate Crisis* (Rowman & Littlefield, 2019), and co-author with Jerry Sumney of *Apocalypse When?: A Guide to Interpreting and Preaching Apocalyptic Texts*. She is also the *EcoPreacher* blogger for Patheos.

Dr. Schade is serving as President of the Academy of Homiletics in 2024. She has been a featured speaker for the Festival of Homiletics, leads workshops and retreats, and keynotes events throughout the country. She is the director of a Wabash grant exploring the use of deliberative dialogue in congregations and theological education and is part of a research exchange with the Kettering Foundation studying the role of religious organizations in democratic community building. Dr. Schade is also conducting a longitudinal research study about ministry, preaching, and social issues that has surveyed nearly 3,000 clergy and 1,000 laity since 2017.


