President's Message Abraham Wright

Crunch is a term often used in sports, but sometimes it abruptly intrudes into Christian discourse as well. For example, it is now crunch time for the International Council of Community Churches. Both the Executive Director and the Office Administrator will leave their post. The President moves to the Immediate Past President, and several of the Vice Presidents change guard, including the Secretary of both the Board of Directors and the Board of Trustees. A crucial vote is to determine whether the Council will maintain the minimum annual contribution requirement or change it to a voluntary annual contribution, while financial support is crucial to meet annual expenses, including the Annual Conference. Metaphorically, the multi-talented Rev. Phil Tom has already been missed. DeAnn Bath, who has been a staple for the Council for over two decades, has been recognized as almost irreplaceable. Crunch time for the Rev. Dr. Bruce Merton, a former Council President who will serve one year as the Interim Executive Director, focusing heavily on nurturing ICCC churches and regions through visitations, giving us some reprieve based on his ICCC experiences; however, the unavoidable challenges are developing a sustainable financial plan to enable the Council to thrive and imminently meet this year's conference required room and beverage costs, and reaching an agreement on a faithful annual contribution for the member churches.

The new proposed annual contribution does not designate a specific amount but does give suggested categories of giving. If a church does not make a contribution to the Council within a given year, that church will be inactive for three years. We pray that those who give now will give at the same level of giving,

and that those who have not given previously would now give as the church is blessed. If churches adopt this attitude, the Council will be blessed, and the first crunch will be defeated. Remember that giving is a commitment. Even Paul, who did not put major emphasis on money, agreed that finances are an essential part of ministry; and that those who do not contribute (work) do not enjoy the fellowship (eat: Thes 3:10). Paralleled with the spiritual gifts, the finances are part of the backbone of the Council, as it is with other institutions that require a budget; it is a necessary entity; otherwise the Council would be substandard, indicating that we are below not what we want, but negligent in what is required.

To further address the "spirit" of this crunch, the Board of Directors proposes that the Council develop a culture of stewardship. Yet, stewardship and discipleship go hand in hand. In fact, some churches regard discipleship as stewardship (loving, keeping, guarding and nourishing). So, stewardship begins at the home-base/church and is further nourished and enriched within the Council. It is a subcategory of discipleship. If we genuinely accept the call to discipleship, we simultaneously realize that finances are not optional, but a must. When we make our commitment to Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior stewardship is or shortly becomes a part of our commitment. When we join the Council, we thus enrich our spiritual-financial gifts. Again, stewardship begins at home and spreads elsewhere: to the spiritual denomination/communion to which the church belongs. So the Board of Directors proposes that a culture of stewardship be introduced to the Council with some specifics on how it should be done.

So, to crunch this issue that practically plagues us—because we are mature enough to have grown in grace—we should humble ourselves as Jesus did, especially as he made the decision to face the cross for us. We ought to seriously ask ourselves, "Do we not give because we do not have, or do we refuse to give because we consciously do not want to give?"

To reiterate, we ought to give and work to help crunch these issues; for God will show us how to do it *if* we openly allow him to do so; the "we" includes all of us.

During the revisiting trip of the Holy Spirit, I pray that we might become more serious about the reenactment of His coming to reinvigorate us, to encourage us to love and to honor goodness, to work in love, and to give; to honor precocious things of the past, but realize that there is One God and One Church; and it is that One God and that One Church that we ought to serve by offering the best we have to support the Church's growth, and do nothing consciously that will tear it down. Let us shake the "dust" from under our feet and offer to God as often as possible our time, our gifts, and our finances.

Peace be with you until we meet in Kansas City, Missouri, either personally or by other means of supporting the Church of God, including the International Council of Community Churches.



ICCC JUNE 2024 2023-2024 Theme: Call to Fellowship (1 John 1:3 ESV)








In May, the Evangelical Christian Publishers Association (ECPA) announced the <u>15</u> <u>winners</u> of the 2024 <u>Christian Book Award</u> <u>program</u>, including the Christian Book of

the Year. Presented annually since 1978, the Christian Book Award program honors the "best of the year" in Christian literature.

ECPA stated that the Christian Book Award winners, named in 12 diverse categories from 65 finalists, truly reflect the breadth and depth of Christian literature. Notably, two books by LYSA TERKEURST won in two categories, and GRANGER SMITH's debut autobiography Triumphed in both the Biography & Memoir and New Author categories, showcasing the variety of voices and perspectives in our community.

"And KNOW that I am God" ~ the United Methodist Church 2024 General Conference



It was my privilege to represent the NOW ICCC on Ecumenical Day, April 30, at The United Methodist Church 2024 General Conference held at the Charlotte Convention Center in Charlotte. The day began early with breakfast at the Convention Center for the sixteen ecumenical quests,

followed by worship at 8:00 a.m. As we processed in at the start of worship, I was paired alongside Rev. Bronwen Boswell (Stated Clerk of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A.) and each of us were assigned a "shepherd" to guide us through the day's events. I was honored to learn that my shepherd was Bishop Patrick Streiff, United Methodist Bishop of Eastern and Central Europe, where he superintends the work of churches in fourteen European countries and two in North Africa. From Switzerland, he spoke fluent English and I found him to be an authentic and humble servant of the Lord who, whenever I addressed him as Bishop Streiff, would respond, "Bruce, call me Patrick." The preacher for opening worship was Dr. Jerry Pillay of the World Council of Churches, and I was pleased to discover that the choir was from my former church at Davidson, North Carolina, which I served 1988-1991. Following worship was a plenary session and then a luncheon for ecumenical and interreligious guests and the United Methodist Council of Bishops.

The most significant change of the 2024 General Conference occurred the following day when the Conference voted to remove, by an affirmative vote of 93%, the discriminatory language against LGBTQ+ persons from the Book of Discipline. The Conference affirmed that its desire is to be a people who share a core belief in Jesus as Lord and Savior, a desire to live together in fellowship, and an additional desire to grow in love with God and our neighbors. In addition to the thousand official delegates from around the world, there were nearly as many observers plus members of the media, and over a thousand volunteers from churches across Western North Carolina to help host the two-week event in Charlotte. It led me to feel a sense of pride and appreciation for our own International Council of Community Churches as I was able to experience the beauty of an international body in all its diversity (1 Corinthians 12).

You won't want to miss hearing Rob who is a highly acclaimed and captivating public speaker. He is a former foster care youth who is leading a truly inspirational life. He has dedicated his life to easing the transition of youth ranging from infants to teenagers who must enter foster care to leave unhealthy and/or unsafe home environments.



Rob will be accompanied by two speakers from the Missouri Department of Social Services, Rebekkah Woods, Children's Service Supervisor and Na-

talie Bolles, Social Services Specialist III. They will briefly explain how Comfort Cases are used to aid children in the Greater Kansas City foster care system.

Immediately following the Missions Luncheon, we will have an opportunity to pack 200 Comfort Cases at our host hotel. These will be destined for children whose lives are suddenly altered as they are removed from unsafe homes to enter Kansas City, MO's foster care system.

The Rev. Dr. Leah D. Schade is the Associate Professor of Preaching Lexington and Worship at Theological Seminary in Kentucky. An ordained Lutheran minister (ELCA) for more than twenty years, Leah earned both her MDiv and PhD degrees from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia (now United Lutheran Seminary). She has pastored congregations in suburban, urban, and rural contexts. Her book, Preaching in the Purple Zone:




Ministry in the Red-Blue Divide (Rowman & Littlefield, 2019), explores how clergy and congregations can address controversial social issues using nonpartisan, biblically-centered approaches and deliberative dialogue. She is also the author of *Creation-Crisis Preaching: Ecology, Theology, and the Pulpit* (Chalice Press, 2015), as well as For the Beauty of the Earth , a Creation-centered Lenten devotional(Chalice Press, 2019). She is co-editor and author with Margaret Bullitt-Jonas of *Rooted and Rising: Voices of Courage in a Time of Climate Crisis* (Rowman & Littlefield, 2019), and co-author with Jerry Sumney of *Apocalypse When?: A Guide to Interpreting and Preaching Apocalyptic Texts*. She is also the EcoPreacher blogger for Patheos.

Dr. Schade is serving as President of the Academy of Homiletics in 2024. She has been a featured speaker for the Festival of Homiletics, leads workshops and retreats, and keynotes events throughout the country. She is the director of a Wabash grant exploring the use of deliberative dialogue in congregations and theological education and is part of a research exchange with the Kettering Foundation studying the role of religious organizations in democratic community building. Dr. Schade is also conducting a longitudinal research study about ministry, preaching, and social issues that has surveyed nearly 3,000 clergy and 1,000 laity since 2017.

Seminar title: "Who am I, or rather who are WE to Judge" an introspective of ministry to the LGBTQ Community and beyond! Led by Rev. Dr. Joseph Ciccone

Interviewing Pope Francis in July, Italian journalist Andrea Tornielli asked the pope how he might act as a confessor to a gay person in light of his now famous remarks in a press conference in 2013, when he asked: "Who am I to judge?"

Francis' reply appears in a new book The Name of God is Mercy to be released soon will be used. It will be used in this workshop.

"On that occasion I said this: If a person is gay and seeks out the Lord and is willing, who am I to judge that person?" the pope says. "I was paraphrasing by heart the Catechism of the Catholic Church where it says that these people should be treated with delicacy and not be marginalized."

This workshop will explore the communities we leave out and reasons the church has weaponized Sacred Scripture against so many. We will talk about morality vs. love, hate vs. tolerance, wounds vs healing and how all faith communities can deal with the spiritual poverty of our time and truly live that idea that "ALL" people are truly welcome with honesty and compassion.

Rev. Dr. Joseph Ciccone is a Priest in the Order of Franciscan Servants, a Progressive Catholic Church and a graduate of Union Theological Seminary in the City of New York. Fr. Joe is the Pastor of Saint Joseph Mission Church in Cliffside Park/Union City NJ, bringing the Gospel to those in the margins and to people in need wherever they may be. Fr Joe completed 9 years of CPE (Chaplain Program) at the Jewish Theological Seminary in NYC and is a member of the National Spiritual Care Association. Fr Joe is also the Police Chaplain for the NJ Fraternal Order of Police Lodge 46. Fr Joe retired after 20 years of service in Law Enforcement in the NJ/NYC Metropolitan area. Fr Joe is married and has been with his partner Darroll, a public-school teacher for the past 28 years. Both truly know the sharp and cutting edge of discrimination and intolerance and now dedicate their lives to making the world a kinder and better place. You have seen, met and talked with Fr. Joe and Darroll at annual conference many times and he is excited to have you attend his workshop.

It is a PERSONAL statement of faith! Join fellow Conferees as we look at each "faith statement" of the Apostle's Creed and share what we mean and understand as we make the UNIQUELY personal declaration: "I believe in..." (This will be a two-part workshop/session.)

PRAYER THAT CHANGES YOU AND YOUR CHURCH. Our conference Scripture issues the imperative, "Persevere in prayer." Prayer is and has been an integral part of the faith experience, both personally and corporately. It is obvious that the early church found prayer effectual and powerful. Prayer changed persons and the church! Join others as we discover/rediscover the elements that make for prayer that is life changing and enhancing for you and your church. (This will be a two-part workshop session on the Worship Track.)

PSALMS: THE PRAYER BOOK OF THE BIBLE. Using Dietrich Bonhoeffer's book, Psalms: the Prayer Book of the Bible, we will explore how the Psalms can form a foundation for personal and corporate prayer. The themes and expressions of the Psalms are as fresh and relevant today as they were when written. In addition to considering Bonhoeffer's insights, participants will be asked to share their favorite Psalm prayer and share their reason for its choice. If possible, participants should read Bonhoeffer's little book on prayer before coming to the sessions. It will be helpful, but not a necessity! (This will be a two-part workshop on the Worship Track.)

Faith, Hope, Life, and Suicide: Creating Hope through Action Led by Rev. Dr. Wendy Childress

What is Suicide? Where does Faith or Hope fit with Suicide? Do those who consider suicide have Faith? These are some of the questions you may have. The goal of this workshop is to answer these questions by providing you with a sound understanding of suicide and suicide ideations, indicators, how to assist in intervention, and understanding the difference between intervention and prevention. This workshop may not change your personal position on this very sensitive and pressing issue but, you will leave enlightened; with a basic understanding of Suicide Intervention; and with a few skills and resources to help family, friends, or others that you encounter who may have suicidal thoughts.

What's In It For Me? Led by Rev. Beth Armstrong

If you're a Christian, if you're involved in any kind of ministry, you're constantly being asked to pray for all kinds of people in all kinds of situations. And that's an honor and privilege! But what about praying for ourselves? Is that ok? Isn't that a little self-centered? In this session, Beth Armstrong will walk us through those questions and give us some insight into why or what we might pray for ourselves.

Rev. Beth Armstrong is a gifted Bible teacher and speaker who has been involved in some form of ministry for over 30 years. From youth ministry to older adult ministry, she has a passion for the Word of God to be taught and infused into all of God's people. She's a graduate of Oklahoma State University. Her vocational career includes high school teacher and coach, retreat and banquet speaker, as well as an activity director at a senior living community. Prayer became real to her as a college student and as a young mom raising two boys. She's a firm believer in the power of prayer, but more importantly a firm believer in the God to whom we pray.
